PAST PRESIDENT AND HISTORIAN

Dear Sisters;

The role of past-president is to mentor by staying involved, keeping in communication with our council and being supportive. We must also remember how important our minutes and archives are in our councils. They should be stored in a safe air tight and waterproof cabinet. Storing all minutes and pertinent information is essential to the preservation of our council history. Never throw out minutes. They should be used when celebrating a milestone such as we, the Hamilton Diocesan Council, will be celebrating 100 years in 2020.

Some councils may be holding elections this year. I hope they go well and as past presidents you play a major role in the elections process by being the organizer of elections and I encourage all past presidents to consider letting their name stand for next year's election. Some councils allow people to continue in their current roles. Please remember being a president is not a life sentence.

Our next section of the Constitution & Bylaws is Part VII: Membership.

Section 1: Categories of Membership

Membership is established and maintained by payment of the annual prescribed membership fee through a local parish council in accordance with Part XVII, Section 4.

- a) General Membership: A Catholic woman 16 years of age or over may become a member with voting privileges and with eligibility for office by election or appointment.
- b) Life Membership: A member, nominated by a diocesan or provincial council, fulfilling the criteria established by the national executive, may be awarded a life membership in national council.
- c) Honorary Life Membership: A member who has served as national president has this distinctive honour bestowed on her.
- d) Associate Membership: A non-Catholic woman 16 years of age or over may become a member with voting privileges, but without eligibility for office by election or appointment. Membership rights and/or conditions may only be amended by a special resolution of the members affected by the amendment in accordance with the *Canada Not-for-profit Corporations Act* (hereinafter referred to as the "Act").

Section 2: Transfer of Membership

A member may transfer to another council and shall not be required to pay a further membership fee for the current year. A member shall hold membership in only one council at any one time. Membership is not transferable to any other person.

Section 3: Termination of Membership

Membership is terminated only when the member's term of membership expires through non-payment of membership fees.



CHRISTIAN FAMILY LIFE

Healing of the Heart for Separated and Divorced





Marriage, a sharing of two lives involving a bonding of souls and spirits in a physical, emotional, mental and spiritual union. A blending of two, a man and a woman where they complete and complement one another to such an extent that they are both better together than as a single being.

The Catholic Church views on marriage & divorce:

Sacramental marriage – Marriage is a covenant by which a man and a woman establish between themselves a partnership of the whole of life. The Catholic Church understands the three essential elements of marriage to be: **permanence** (i.e., indissolubility, meaning that the marriage bond ceases only with the death of one of the spouses), **faithfulness** (i.e., marriage is an exclusive union between one man and one woman) and **openness to the possibility of new life** (i.e., the couple must be open to possibility of having and raising children) (CCC 1643). Once a valid marriage bond is created, its continued existence no longer depends on the will of the parties (CCC 1640). The marriage bond continues to exist even if the parties no longer wish to be married, and even if they have been separated for many years or have obtained a civil divorce. The Catholic Church does not permit divorce and remarriage without a Church declaration that the first marriage was invalid (CCC 2384).

While the marriage between any two people is an indissoluble covenant, it is also a sacrament when it is celebrated between two baptized Christians (Catholic, Orthodox, Anglican or Protestant). In a sacramental marriage, the couple receives additional graces to perfect their love for one another and to strengthen their commitment (CCC 1641).

Annulment or Declaration of Nullity is an official determination by a Church Tribunal that what appeared to be a valid marriage was actually not one (i.e., that the marriage was in fact invalid). While a civil divorce says that it dissolves an existing marriage, an annulment declares that a marriage bond never existed in the first place. A person must receive an annulment before they consider remarriage.

Sadly not all marriages make it until death do us part. There are many reasons for a failed marriage: adultery, addiction, or abuse but indifference is often the real reason. One partner cannot save a marriage single-handedly.

Separation/divorce is more than simply the loss of your spouse; there is concern for the children, the split on holidays, vacations, & family events, financial insecurity, loss of friends and family etc. It is a difficult time in their lives, where people can experience feelings of bitterness, anger or selfishness. A time of loneliness, discouragement, and an overwhelming sense of loss. A divorced person feels the desperation and sorrow of a failed marriage.

Questions Frequently Asked

- Divorce is not a sin unless you are divorcing without serious reason or on a whim. The church does not keep divorced Catholics from receiving the sacraments.
- Divorce or separated persons are not excommunicated and is still a Catholic in good standing.
- The only reason for excommunication after divorce is remarriage without going through the annulment process.
- ❖ You receive an annulment through a Catholic Diocesan Tribunal. It does not mean that the marriage never took place but it is a determination that a sacramental marriage did not take place.
- Children born from the marriage are not illegitimate or that the couple was "living in sin".
- The Catholic Church is not here to condemn but to console and to help them find peace, power and a renewed passion for life.

As we now enter the Fall and Winter of our year, I would like to remind you of possible areas that you can be donating in conjunction with your sister members.

We as an organization at the Hamilton Diocesan level support the "Pornography Hurts" campaign with the placement of signs on roadside billboards, in bus shelters and on the sides of buses throughout the dioceses.

There is also "Our Lady of Good Counsel" bursary money to help in some small way, the costs to our diocese seminarians. This year four young men will receive a gift of \$500 each at the Vocation Mass this September at Immaculate Conception Church, Formosa. LEGISLATION

Warmest greetings and blessings to All,

I hope everyone was able to enjoy time with family and friends over the summer months. With fall upon us and as the leaves change colour, there is always ONE constant. "When everything seems to be changing, we can reply on God's constancy." - Hebrews 13:8. Through His constancy we grow in faith to achieve greater holiness as sisters in Christ.

For your ease of reading and referencing, I have broken down this directive into categories. As well, I have included an "Eye on Legislation" attachment.

SCANVENGER HUNT:

A reminder to all councils/members of the Provincial Scavenger Hunt Challenge. You will recall that our Provincial Legislation Chairwomen challenged each council/member to participate as a means of educating members about events that can lead to homelessness, and ways we can help end homelessness. Councils and/or members are to form a team and select one of three scenarios provided and work through the specific activities provided for the scenario they select. Councils/members will learn together the many ways we can help the homeless, through discovering what legislation is in place and the various programs available in our communities. The deadline for this activity and to submit your survey is October 16th (World Day of Hunger). LEGISLATION WORKSHOPS:

Over the past year my goal was to help our members gain a better understanding of the Legislation portfolio and to encourage and increase interest and participation of our members. Some initiatives that I undertook to fulfill this goal were to form a Diocesan Legislation subcommittee, and to develop a Legislation 101 Presentation. In doing so, I was able to create templates and hand-outs to share with our members in an effort to assist and encourage engagement and participation. My sub-committee members and I have accepted invitations to be guest speakers at council meetings, and I collaborated with the Diocesan Resolutions Chairperson to deliver a Resolution/Legislation Mini Workshop at our Hamilton Diocesan Convention this past May 2018. We are also scheduled to deliver a workshop at the fall Hamilton regional meeting. With the help of my two sub-committee members, we have made some encouraging progress, and we will continue to work on ways to better serve and assist you.

Ontario CWL Provincial Convention July 2018

At the recent Ontario CWL provincial convention, members approved resolution ON.18.02 Immediate Implementation of Income Security: A Roadmap for Change for Ontarians with a Disability. LEGISLATION ATTACHMENT: EYE ON LEGISLATION:

DEFEATED BILLS:

Bill S-230 *Drug-Impaired Driving Detection Act* was defeated in second reading in the House of Commons. This bill would have supported both resolutions 2005.07 Illegal Manufacture and Trafficking of Crystal Methamphetamine and 2004.12 Marijuana Possession/Use – A Criminal Offence. Continue to encourage members to contact the prime minister, attorney general and federal ministers of health and justice on these issues.

BILL UPDATES IN THE HOUSE OF COMMONS:

Bill C-211 Federal Framework on Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder Act has been referred to the Senate Committee on National Security and Defence following second reading in the Senate.

Bill C-243 *National Maternity Assistance Program Strategy Act* is in second reading in the Senate.

Bill C-277 *Framework on Palliative Care in Canada Act* has passed and received royal assent. Continue to monitor the development of palliative care in Canada and offer assistance where applicable.

Bill C-404 An Act to amend the Assisted Human Reproduction Act. It has gone through first reading in the House of Commons and needs the immediate attention of members. Please encourage members to urge members of parliament (MPs) to vote against this bill that would commodify human life. This bill not only speaks against the many pro-life resolutions and Resolution 2011.01 Prohibition of Practices re Human Reproductive Material, but even more so it is against Resolution 2000.02 The Prohibition of the Sale of Human Embryonic or Foetal Tissue, or Reproductive Services.

BILL UPDATES IN THE SENATE:

Bill S-5 An Act to amend the Tobacco Act and the Non-smokers' Health Act and to make consequential amendments to other Acts received royal assent. Contact MPs and the federal minister of health to ensure the manufacture, sale, labelling and promotion of vaping products are being regulated.

Bill S-228 *Child Health Protection Act* is in second reading in the House of Commons. It has been reviewed by the Standing Committee on Health and was returned to the House of Commons with amendments.

Bill S-240 An Act to amend the Criminal Code and the Immigration and Refugee Protection Act (trafficking in human organs) has been reviewed by the Senate Committee on Human Rights and was returned to Senate with amendments.

Please continue to contact your government representatives with respect to the Bills listed above. Let us all eencourage our members and councils to write letters to the Prime Minister, MPs, MPP's and appropriate ministers who make decisions on these issues.

I participated in the Resolutions dialogue, where we discussed the three resolutions presented. It was an opportunity to understand the resolutions more fully. I sent out a directive with information on these resolutions:

ON.18.01	Develop national standards for levels of pharmaceuticals in Canada's drinking water
ON.18.02	Full implementation of Income Security: A Roadmap for Change
ON.18.03	To fully implement alternative sentencing to incarceration of Indigenous offenders

All three resolutions were passed and moved on to the National level. The resolutions were very well written and brought attention to issues that that all of us need to know about. I urge all of you to please take the time to read them, share them with your councils and to implement the action plans contained in the resolutions.

I want to continue encouraging all of you to think of ideas, of things that you think should be changed in the world to make it better. Please feel free to talk to me about your topics and ideas; I will help you as much as I can. Remember, you do not have to write resolutions on your own, form a committee, talk to other councils, even other dioceses. But take the first step and be God's voice in your world.

Report #1 – view from 2 Diocesan Officers:

Joyful voices raised in song and laughter, hugs and tears greeting old friends and making new, a room filled with love, compassion and prayer. This report outlines what you are missed at the Ontario Provincial CWL Annual Convention in Toronto from July 7 to July 12, 2018.

The weekend began with a Medieval Times Dinner and Show on Saturday night where members in attendance enjoyed the lively prancing of the horses and the costumes of some of the CWL members. An optional tour of Ripley's Aquarium was attended by some members early Sunday morning, including Hamilton Diocese's own Resolution Chairperson Vicki Lee, who spoke to the fishes. In the afternoon, an enthusiastic discussion of the three resolutions took place. A wonderful opening Mass with His Eminence Thomas Cardinal Collins, Archbishop of Toronto and a reception followed.

Early morning business sessions on Monday July 9 began with keynote speaker Dr. Naheed Dosani and Glenna Fraumeni from PEACH: Palliative Education and Care for the Homeless. PEACH operates as a "trailblazing" mobile unit, providing attentive care on the streets, in shelters, and with community-based service in collaboration with Toronto Central CCAC (Community Care Access Centre). They spoke on their philosophy of care and model of engagement to the homeless.

In the afternoon, each Diocesan President gave a report on the highlights of the activities involving homelessness in their diocese. Joan Schurter gave a wonderful presentation for Hamilton Diocese.

Each Diocesan President and Provincial Executive member was given a different title of "Mary" to research and learn from. They were asked to describe how "Mary" had influenced their role as president/chair. For example, Health and Education chair, Wilma Vanderzwaag choose "Mary of the Inflicted". Wilma encouraged members to "Look to Mary when you are weary and in need of strength."

The afternoon concluded with a beautiful "Crowning of Mary" in its simplest form. Provincial President Ann Madden processed the "crown" and members sang along with a video and audio version of the hymn Hail Mary, Gentle Women.

The Hamilton Diocesan group of nineteen, had great fellowship and excellent food at "Jack Astor's", followed by a night of hilarity as members from the group participated in the fun night of "CWL Diocesan Family Feud".

Tuesday began with Eucharistic Celebration where Most Reverend Archbishop Brendan O'Brien gave a moving homily on God's will and our service to the homeless. Presentation of three Resolutions followed, and all passed. Theresa Winchester, our former Kitchener regional chair presented the 2nd resolution on behalf of the Military Ordinariate.

Resolutions:

ON.18.01 Develop national standards for levels of pharmaceuticals in Canada's drinking water ON.18.02 Full implementation of *Income Security: A Roadmap for Change* for disabled adult Ontarians

ON.18.03 To fully implement alternative sentencing to incarceration of Indigenous offenders In the afternoon, all were invited to attend breakout sessions and hear how six organizations in the Toronto area are addressing homeless issues. Joyce attended sessions with "Covenant House" and "Sistering" and Catherine heard presentations from "Ontario 211" and HomeShare".

"Covenant House" is a youth shelter that helps 300 youth daily through housing placement, food, health care, counselling/support, job training, and mentoring. They also deal with many individuals who have been involved in human trafficking.

"Sistering" is a drop in centre and shelter for women with medical, mental conditions and addictions. They serve three hot meals a day (400 – 450 meals/daily) and have shower facilities, overnight beds, counselling 24 hours/day.

"Ontario 211" is a province wide telephone helpline (2-1-1) and website which provides a gateway to community, social, non-clinical health and related government services.

The underlying premise of "HomeShare" is that two people have needs and something to offer. The organization facilitates home owners and those looking for housing meeting those needs in a mutually beneficial manner. A home provider offers accommodation to a housemate in exchange for an agreed level of help.

A night of socializing and dancing rounded out the night. At the banquet, National President Margaret Ann Jacobs was presented the Pro Ecclesia et Pontifice (Latin: For Church and Pope) decoration by His Eminence Thomas Cardinal Collins, Archbishop of Toronto. What a wonderful surprise for her and for us in attendance!

On the final day, Most Reverend Archbishop Brendan O'Brien spoke on Catholic Education Symposium, World Meeting of Families, and the Senate on Youth & Vocations. A spiritual bouquet was given to Archbishop O'Brien in honour of his 50th Year of Ordination.

Margaret Ann Jacobs, our National President inflamed our spirits with her message focused on Envisioning Our Future as "servant leaders". To offer ourselves to God and let Him lead us; to be good listeners; to value everyone's contribution; seek input and opinion to facilitate a truly collaborative effort; give encouragement, recognize and affirm; and to celebrate with joy the success of each accomplishment are only a few of the highlights of her talk.

A wide variety of prayer services, masses and other opportunities to pray together were offered throughout the convention. We look forward to attending the 72nd Ontario Provincial Convention in Kingston in 2019 with our sisters in the League from Hamilton Diocese.

National Convention took place in Winnipeg - August 12-15, 2018

We had the opportunity to visit the Canadian Museum of Human Rights on the Saturday evening. Since we had three busloads we were divided into groups of about 18 so we would not all be in the same section at the same time. Our group used the freight elevator to our first level. Our guide was very informative and explained many things so unfortunately we were not able to view many of the exhibits while he talked. At the end of the tour coffee and cake were served.

Sunday morning many went on the city tour of Winnipeg where the guide explained different sites of the city including the historic business section and we ended up in the Leo Mol Gardens where many of Leo Mol statues are on display.

At the Resolutions Dialogue in the afternoon four resolutions were discussed.

The Opening Mass was held at St. Boniface Cathedral. A smudging ceremony took place before Mass and following Mass we had Opening Ceremonies and Welcome Reception followed.

Monday morning began with Mass at St. Mary's Cathedral directly across the street from the hotel. Following Mass sessions began. We were reminded that we were on Treaty I territory. Credentials were given and Provincial Presidents gave their oral reports. Margaret Ann Jacobs, National President, gave her report including some of the places where she travelled. Janet McLean, Secretary/Treasurer gave her report and announced that the registration fee in 2019 will be raised from \$50 to \$100.

After lunch we heard from Kim Scammell, Executive Director who described national staff as a CPU and online membership has been reinstated.

Joan Bona, Resolutions Chair reported 10 resolutions were submitted to National for approval, 6 from British Columbia/Yukon, 1 from Manitoba and 3 from Ontario. Six resolutions were not recommended for presentation including Ontario's.

Most of the remaining Standing Committee Chairs gave their reports and resolutions were discussed. We closed the afternoon with Commissioning of the New Life Members.

Tuesday morning we began with Mass at St. Mary's Cathedral and following Mass we broke into pre-chosen Break-Out Sessions at the RBC Convention Centre – Sessions were Environment, Homelessness, Mental Health, Indigenous Issues, Human Trafficking and Pornography.

After lunch Keynote speaker was Most Rev. Murray Chatlain, Archbishop of Keewatin-the Pas who spoke on reconciliation — what might it look like for us? 3 principles for reconciliation 1) we are all part of a common humanity; 2) we all have the capacity to evolve and change; 3) we yearn for unity and peace. Steps to moving forward — 1) we let go of our need to be right; 2) genuine, heartfelt hope that the other will find healing; 3) we desire to understand the other; 4) we are open to recognize our own darkness; 5) patience. We should listen slowly — work smarter and listen slowly. Let go of that relationship if it dishonours God. Let go of your attachment to money. Let go of your power — be a servant. Let go of your addiction — admit it and get help.

We closed the day with Memorial Service for Deceased Members. Provincial presidents placed a red rose for deceased members in a vase and Margaret Ann Jacobs placed a white rose in memory of our dearly departed spiritual advisors.

Wednesday morning we were presented with Building on Foundation, the League of the future. The Catholic Women's League of Canada Plans Strategically. Core purpose – uniting Catholic women to grow in faith, and to promote social justice through service to the church, Canada and the world. Core values – faith, service and social justice. Mission statement – The Catholic Women's League of Canada calls its members to grow in faith, and to witness to the love of God through ministry and service. Envisioned future – The Catholic women's League of Canada is an inclusive and engaged community of Catholic women inspired by faith. It is a vital participant in the church, a valued partner for social justice, a respected advocate at all government levels and connected to the world. The objectives and strategies were then presented to us.

The two remaining standing committee chairs gave their reports – resolutions and legislation.

After lunch we were invited to the 99th National Convention in Calgary, Alberta August 18-21, 2019 and be branded in Christ.

Betty Colaneri gave the Centenary Report and showed the video God Bless You Canada by Lee Greenwood.

Bishop McGratten during his 5-year term served in 3 dioceses – Toronto, Peterborough and Calgary. He stated the role of the national spiritual advisor is being in the background and commended by bishops that we need to change from within and introduced in the new incoming spiritual advisor Bishop Jansen.


Part of this house is a real mess ... maybe we'll just stay in the front room.
