Dear Sisters in the League

Hopefully spring is in the air and the robins are singing their merry tunes. Before we know it, crocuses will be pushing their noses up through the cold ground.

I have heard from many councils during the past cold, frosty days that they have and are continuing to focus on the homelessness. Recently I heard a comment that stuck in my mind "they are not homeless people, they are people experiencing homelessness." Historically individuals experiencing homelessness in Canada were older, single men. The homelessness crisis we see today is much more diverse, including youth, (couch surfers), women, families, women with children, seniors, veterans, foster children and the indigenous people. One particular home this past winter in January that can accommodate 51 men had an overflow of 60 to be placed in other locations. This was the highest number they had seen in over 5 years. Please spend time learning and discussing what causes a person or groups to be homeless. Even seniors who have no one to care for them can be homeless - even though they may have a roof over their heads but no support. Choose a group in your area and see how you can help in some small way.

All councils should have received (and possibly returned) the increase in per capita fee instructed vote. Hamilton Diocesan Council proposed a Diocesan per capita fee increase from \$3.00 per member to \$6.00 per member effective January 1st, 2019. This increase would help with printing materials, mileage, and convention costs. Parish councils are asked to inform their members, hold the vote and record the numbers both for and against. Please complete the instructed vote form keeping one copy for you and return one to myself by May 5th, 2018. **Bring the copy with you to the convention to ensure that you can vote.**

I am happy to report that I received and submitted to Ontario Provincial Council six nominations for the Social justice Award. All nominees have given extraordinary service in social justice issues contributing to the betterment of her community. They demonstrated exemplary leadership, generosity of spirit and living the mission of the league. The chosen member to receive this award will be announced at the Ontario Provincial Convention in Toronto in July.

Remember to mark May 25th, 26th, 27th, 2018. on your calendar. These are the dates for your Hamilton Diocesan Convention being held at the Delta Conference Centre in Guelph. Opening Mass will be celebrated May 25th at St. Joseph, Guelph at 7:30 p.m. with Bishop Matthew Ustryzcki and the closing Mass Sunday, May 27th at 3:00 p.m. at Basilica of Our Lady

This fall will mark our 17th Annual Vocation's Mass, September 16th at Immaculate Conception Church, Formosa at 2:00 p.m. More information will be available in the coming months.

Do you wish to be enhanced, empowered, and energized by the Fire of the Spirit? We know not everyone is or wants to be a leader. Nonetheless God called each of us to lead in our own way. Catch the Fire and S'Mores will give your league knowledge of how to be a fire-starter who helps someone become a leader. This is a CWL Leadership Training package from the National Leadership Development Committee. Topics cover such items as objects of the league, effective meetings, mentoring, how to develop a council's policy and procedure manual, resolutions, ethical guideline, league resources and more. PAST PRESIDENT AND HISTORIAN

With councils struggling to find leaders to take roles many are sharing responsibilities but they need to remember that the position held has only one vote in matters needing a motion whether it is president or a standing committee chair. Be sure to settle that issue before any hard feelings take over.

Some councils also allow people to continue in their current roles. Although it may be needed short term it is not necessarily healthy for the council – being president should not be a life sentence.

We do need to keep our councils alive and functioning. We do need someone to chair meetings/gatherings, a keeper of the minutes (recording secretary) and a keeper of the coin (treasurer) and it is important to have a person to keep you spiritually fed (spiritual development) and another to ensure membership is paid (organization). We can also add a few others to even out the executive to look after sharing information from standing chairs as it relates to councils.

In Part V: Policy of the Constitution & Bylaws

The policy of the League shall be:

- 1. To have membership and operation based on the parish unit, with diocesan, provincial and national representational levels
- 2. To operate on a system of standing committees and to make the fullest possible use of these committees in the involvement of all members
- 3. To develop leadership qualities and provide training to enable members to take active roles in the affairs of their faith, community and society
- 4. To maintain affiliation with the World Union of Catholic Women's Organizations
- 5. To cooperate at all levels with other organizations where and in whatever manner the council concerned agrees is necessary or desirable to accomplish the Objects of the League
- 6. To maintain liaison with pastoral councils in accordance with the Code of Canon Law
- 7. To remain politically non-partisan

EDUCATION AND HEALTH

The next 12 months our directive will be on Mental Health; Euthanasia and assisted suicide will remain active while doing "12 hours of prayers for palliative care."

We can do this by inviting councils to educate members about the seriousness of mental health and it effects all ages.

Promoting Mental Health through the lifespan: Children and Teens.

The word Resilience means the ability to recover quickly from difficulties.

Confidence- to believe in one's abilities. To grow and be confident.

Competence- how to handle situations effectively.

Connection- that they know they have someone to talk to - school, home, a friend that they also feel safe and secure. The family is the central force in any Child's life.

Character- the children senses right from wrong and also to make the right choice.

Contribution- The children know that they can contribute to the world and make it a better place "serving feels good and people care about what I say."

Coping- When children learn to deal with the stress, they can overcome challenges.

Control- When children realize they can control their outcome or their actions, they know they can do anything, but as parents, we need to let them make their own decisions.

LEGISLATION

Warmest greetings and blessings to all,

As we embark on a new year and continue this journey together, let's reflect on the following message from a Homily given by Pope Francis, in Havana Cuba (September 2015) *"Being a Christian entails promoting the dignity of our brothers and sisters, fighting for it, living for it."* I thank my Provincial counterpart for sharing this reflection with us.

In my 1st Directive I shared some highlights of the important role the Legislation Standing Committee Chairperson plays in the CWL. Our Provincial Legislation Standing Committee Chairperson Karen McDonald reminds us that our dedicated service is required more than ever as this new year promises to be busy with a June 7, 2018, election looming and many Bills and *Acts* requiring our attention.

As Catholic women, we are taught to live by our family values as Mother Mary did, and not just talk about them. We are women "rooted in gospel values" and women of action, who have improved the lives of those less fortunate. We do this each time we take action by challenging our politicians to include core family values (as presented in our resolutions) in their decision making, and to advocate in parliament on our behalf. The gospels depict several occasions when Jesus stood up to injustices and laboured for the betterment of the society of His day. Let us call these examples to mind as we are also called to stand up to injustices and to improve and enhance the lives of all.

I would like to share with you a link I received over the holidays of a 37sec video clip of MP Cathy McLead presenting our CWL petition requesting the federal government to specifically identify hospice palliative care as a defined medical service covered under the *Canada Health Act*. Together, we gathered *32,741* signatures, and delivered the Petition to Member of Parliament - Cathy McLeod, to present in the House of Commons. I encourage you to watch it as it demonstrates yet another example of what our League is capable of through YOUR voice and YOUR actions.

Our National Legislation Chairperson Nancy Simms advised of the following two items of good news:

With the hope that the League's voice made a difference, **Bill C-233 National Strategy for Alzheimer's Disease and Other Dementias Act** was passed by the Senate and House of Commons and received Royal Assent on June 22, 2017.

On November 8, 2017, the House of Commons Standing Committee on Justice and Human Rights reversed the course of the government's efforts to repeal section 176 of the *Criminal Code* by voting to retain the provision (with amendments). Section 176 prohibits activity that obstructs or interferes with religious officials seeking to perform their religious duties.

Bill C-51 will no longer attempt to remove protections in law for clergy and worship services.

Also, in my 1st Directive, I extended an invitation to you to consider joining as a member of the Diocesan Legislative Standing Committee. I am very excited that this committee is underway, and we are currently looking at ways to better support you in taking action on Resolutions and Private Members Bills. We are hoping to identify ways to encourage and engage our members to take action, by reviewing and analyzing the possible reasons why some don't and/or can't. It is our hope to provide each Council with the support and tools they need to help address these issues and increase participation. I invite you to share your concerns or ideas with me. Every petition, letter, email, and telephone call are important, as every member's voice/signature counts.

Here is a list is being shared from our National Legislative Chairperson Nancy Simms via our Provincial Legislation Chairperson Karen McDonald of private members' bills requiring **action** by contacting MPs, ministers & Prime Minister. Postage is going up but *mail addressed to parliament is always* **FREE**. Legislation updates can be found at

** We are **not** expected to take action on all of these bills ... pick one or two of interest. As Nancy states, "There is so much important work taking place in Parliament that creates an abundance of information to share. Don't get overwhelmed." **

Bill C-254 An Act to amend the *Excise Tax Act* (baby products) is in first reading in the House of Commons. Members are asked to contact government officials to request support for the bill especially with adoption of **Resolution 2017.03 Zero-Rated Status Under the Goods and** *Services Tax Provisions of the Excise Tax Act* for Child Safety Products.

Bill C-282 An Act to amend the Excise Tax Act and the Income Tax Act (extra energy-efficient products); Bill C-283 An Act to amend the Canadian EnvironmentalProtection Act, 1999 (electronic products recycling program); and Bill C-287 An Act to amend the Canadian Environmental Protection Act, 1999 (nanotechnology) are all in first reading in the House of Commons and support Resolution 2006.04 Renewable Energy and other League resolutions seeking to protect the environment.

Bill C-313 National Strategy on Advertising to Children Act is in first reading and supports communications resolutions seeking protection in media for children and families.

Bill C-249 An Act to amend the *Public Health Agency of Canada Act* (National Alzheimer Office) is in first reading in the House of Commons and proposes the establishment of a national Alzheimer Office within the Public Health Agency of Canada. This would support the League's ongoing call for compassionate care for the sick.

Bill C-350 An Act to amend the *Criminal Code* and the *Immigration and Refugee Protection Act* (trafficking and transplanting human organs and other body parts) is in first reading in the House of Commons and supports the League's human trafficking resolutions.

The following bills changed status:

Bill C-211 Federal Framework on Post-traumatic Stress Disorder Act is in second reading in the Senate.

Bill C-277 Framework on Palliative Care in Canada Act received Royal Assent on December 12, 2017.

Bill C-243 National Maternity Assistance Program Strategy Act passed the House of Commons with amendments and has had first reading in the Senate.

Bill S-228 Child Health Protection Act passed third reading in the Senate and is in second reading in the House of Commons.

Bill S-225 An Act to amend the *Controlled Drugs and Substances Act* (substances used in production of fentanyl) was passed by the Senate with amendment at third reading.

Bill S-5 An Act to amend the *Tobacco Act* and the *Non-smokers' Health Act* and to make consequential amendments to other Acts was passed by the Senate with an amendment and is in second reading in the House of Commons

Also, please review the four resolutions adopted at last summer's Annual National Convention, if you haven't already, which can be found at www.cwl.ca under the Resolutions tab on the main page under the subtitles.

Please remember, we are not expected to take action on everything. Select one or two that speak to your heart and go from there. Do what you can as member and as a Council, and remember that help is only a phone call away.

RESOLUTIONS

Happy New Year, everyone! I hope that all of you had a blessed, safe, healthy and happy Christmas with family and friends. Here we are in a brand new year, 2018. As I get older, I am amazed at how fast the time goes. So the burning question I have wanted to ask is....How many of you made a New Year's resolution? The start of a new year is a perfect time for a new start. How many of you pledged to lose weight this year, or boost your prayer time, or any number of things we want to change in ourselves or our lives?

Personal resolutions are very similar to the resolutions we talk about in the Catholic Women's League. The idea is the same, only your intention is not to just change things for you but to look beyond ourselves to your friends and community. The steps that you consider when making your personal resolutions are very similar to the research you do for a Catholic Women's League resolution.

For example (written in resolution form), I want to lose weight. <u>RESOLUTION</u>

Whereas I recognise that I am overweight; and

Whereas I realise that losing weight will benefit me in the long run with respect to being healthier and more active in my life; and

Whereas eating healthier will benefit not only me but my family in the long term, therefore be it

Resolved that I will try to lose weight in 2018.

A one-page brief needs be written with scientific evidence to support all the claims I have made in the above whereas clauses (losing weight will help me be healthy, be more active, and will help those around me). My action plan will suggest ways I can help this resolution to succeed: I can visit my doctor for his help, I can choose to eat vegetables rather than chocolate bars, I can go for a walk three times a week or to the gym, I can find a friend to journey with me as I struggle in my weight loss journey.

This example may seem simplistic and I am in no way trying to down play the hard work and effort that goes into writing a resolution, but sometimes changing the way we think about something can better help us understand where to start. I had never thought of my new year's

GOALS

In the fall Spectrum I said that my goals for this term included developing our skills and knowledge of Catholic history and how the Church has changed our world for the better. I am reading a book titled: "How the Catholic Church Built Western Civilization" and was rather astonished to see eleven chapters that identify our contributions to the world. It's rather like looking at current legislation and recognizing the influence the League has had to make Ontario and all of Canada a kinder and more caring place to live.

I've also learned about the reasons behind some of our habits. As a convert to the Catholic Church, I am captivated by our traditions. For instance, did you know that our tradition of genuflecting comes from the court etiquette of the Middle Ages? Genuflecting on the left knee was a meant as a pledge of service or a sign of honour to a king or noble. When Christians adopted the habit of genuflecting to show honour to our Lord in the Tabernacle, they distinguished it from the court genuflection by using the right knee. In martial arts, no one ever turns his/her back to the sensei, but rather backs away as a sign of respect (so a couple of my grandkids tell me). Isn't it appropriate, then, that as Catholics coming into (or leaving) the presence of the King who is far more than any ancient king or martial arts instructor, we are mindful of how we honour Him by our posture? It is when our behaviour matches our beliefs that we are strongest.

SPIRITUAL DEVELOPMENT

My dear sisters in the League,

It is my pleasure to provide two reflections for use as a part of your Lenten observance. The first is an adaptation of a poem originally composed by William Arthur Ward. The second is from Pope Francis's homily at mass at the Vatican on Saturday, December 30, 2017.

Fasting & Feasting

The following talk was taken from our Hamilton Diocesan CWL archives. It was presented at the 42nd Annual Diocesan Convention, in 1962, by Mrs. Mel Walters, Ontario Provincial President.



Because we are Canadians, we take so much for granted. Most people accept what they have as what they deserve. But this is not so. If you have ever seriously talked to someone who has come from some troubled foreign country to live here in Canada, you will know what I mean. There are very few people who think that far-off countries like Japan and Africa deserve any of our concern. Those countries, and many others, are starving while we sit here in Canada and throw away leftovers, or perhaps an apple, because it has a bruise on it! What these people in Japan could do with a bruised apple or a little leftover meat and vegetables! But no; because we are Canadians, we do not have to worry about these other starving countries that need our help so much. My point is this: because we are Canadians, we have an abundant supply of food and clothing. Most of us would never think of having to go without a meal because there was no food.

In Canada, we have a democratic government that provides us with many right that, again, we take for granted. We have the right to vote once we come of age. We can make our problems known, through the representatives we ourselves selected to the government. We cannot always be sure our wishes will be granted, for certainly the government cannot please everyone at once.

Another privilege we take for granted is the right to obtain an education. We should consider ourselves lucky that education is compulsory until we are sixteen. When we are young, we complain about having to go to school, but when most people have finished their education, and have gone so far past that time that they cannot turn back, they wish they had stayed in school longer.

While we take our education for granted here in Canada, people in other countries are begging for someone to come across the ocean to teach them how to farm and how to live properly. Wouldn't these people love the privileges and opportunities of Canadians?



We have a high standard of living here that is admired by many other countries. We do not have the starvation problems like many other countries, and our workers have decent working hours, conditions and benefits. The farmers can be educated to take care of and preserve their land. We have an abundance of doctors and nurses to care for the sick.

In Canada, buildings are inspected and if they are dangerous, they are demolished and not left standing with the danger increased, as in many other countries.

This is what it means to be a Canadian. We can live our own lives, with our government trying to help us. We have the right to educate ourselves and choose our own occupation. We, and our relatives, are protected by insurance and acts made available by the government. No matter what it means to be a Canadian, most of us take it all for granted. I often wonder just what would happen to us, if suddenly we were forced to live as poorly as some do in other countries. It is thought to consider, but I hope we will never know the answer.







2018 FRANCES LOVERING INFORMATION & APPLICATION

The *Frances Lovering Woman of the Year Award* was instituted in 2000 to honor Frances Lovering, a member of the first national executive of the CWL and our first diocesan president.

Nomination forms are distributed annually in the early part of the year, and any completed forms are **submitted to Joan Schurter (<u>cwl.jschurter@gmail.com</u>) by April 10, 2018**. A five member review team, made up of Diocesan Executive, then examines each nomination to determine a winner.

There are no formal criteria for this nomination. We invite your and your executive to take a good look at the women in your council and nominate one of your wonderful women for this special distinction. The nominee is to be a member who demonstrates the objectives of the League in her service to the League, her parish and the community. Diocesan executive members are not eligible for this award while they are in office.

All nominees are acknowledged for their nomination at the closing banquet at our annual convention and presented with a *Certificate of Congratulations*. The award winner receives the large commemorative plaque, to keep in her parish for the next year, and is presented with a personal plaque.

Other Information:

- Most nominations from councils are done without the nominee knowing. While this is not a requirement, most councils like the surprise.
- The winner is not notified; however the council president or contact person is notified if your nominee is chosen. Together with your council, every effort is made to ensure that the winner is present at the convention's closing banquet.
- Our Woman of the Year has her picture taken with the Bishop, and is honored with the ovation of her League sisters.
