#### **DIOCESAN PRESIDENT**

Dear Sisters in the League

Happy spring. Hopefully by the time many of you read this issue of the Spectrum, spring will be well on its way and the snow and deep freeze of the past winter will be just a memory.

Where has the time gone? Would you believe that in 2 months my term as President is over and you will have a new President and officers. I would like to thank the ladies of Hamilton Diocese for the experience of a lifetime. Being President of the best diocese in Canada has been an honour and pleasure.

Our Warmth and Comfort program was an overwhelming success. Members in Hamilton Diocese gathered and collected 10523 pairs of socks, 180 jars of peanut butter and 149 boxes of crackers (there may have been more not reported). The Province of Ontario collected 37465 pairs of socks. We were very pleased and proud of the outcome and the generosity of our members/parishioners. We encourage councils to continue supporting the homeless in your own way.

"Care for Our Common Home", our new national theme became effective on January 1<sup>st</sup>, 2019. We will be reflecting on "God's creation and marvel that everything, human and non-human alike, belongs to God", with a special focus on water. Water is an indispensable resource for life. Canada is – or has been – magnificently rich in fresh water. Looking at the global level, Pope Francis points out "an acute water shortage may occur within a few decades unless urgent action is taken". The environmental repercussions could affect billions of people; it is conceivable that the control of water by large multinational business may become a major source of conflict in this century."

Education and awareness of the current state of water in this province, country and around the world is desperately needed.

A sign of hope for Canadians is the growing popularity of The Blue Communities project, a movement that recognizes water as a human right, promotes publicity owned and operated water service, and bans the sale of bottled water. Already several municipalities have accepted these conditions of membership and a number of municipalities and campuses now ban bottle water.

We will be promoting our diocesan spiritual theme "Welcome Home' at our spring regional meetings, on Earth Day and at our annual convention. More details will be coming soon.

The Catholic Women's League strategic plan for 2018-2022 was rolled out at the 98<sup>th</sup> annual national convention in Winnipeg, Manitoba. Looking to the future and the strategic plan to come, you can be sure the league is in good hands. Members look ahead with optimism and

trust that the Holy Spirit will guide, inspire and walk with them into what might seem like uncharted waters. I believe the League will be better than ever! I urge you to keep the faith, celebrate each other and all that is good and remain open to the process that will help members be what is needed at this time.

#### SPIRITUAL DEVELOPMENT

My dear sisters in the League,

As we begin a new season of growth in our faith, I think it is good to reflect on what spiritual development is or could be in our lives. It is also helpful to remind ourselves that the process and character of spiritual development varies from person to person and that it is not a "one size fits all" proposition.

One place to start is with the understanding that true spiritual development is not about becoming more spiritual in a measurable sense. Rather, it is about realizing or becoming more and more aware of one's natural, innate spirituality. We all can point to times in our lives when this has been a slow and gradual process, at other times there have been significant leaps of realization, both of which are part of the ongoing 'developing' process. Unlike the development of a photograph, individuals don't reach a finished state of spiritual development in this life, but participate in the ongoing process of spiritual realization.

According to Dominican Father Fred Lucci, director of the All Saints Catholic Newman Center at Arizona State University in Tempe, Arizona, "If God's creation is anything, it is diverse, and God intentionally desires every diversity. That diversity is most evident in the uniqueness of every human person and various temperaments. While union with God, the end goal of spiritual development, is a desire of every human heart, different persons with different temperaments will naturally find different paths through different prayer forms and spiritual expressions to that union. Throughout history, God has inspired the creation of various religious orders and congregations, each with its own charism to address a particular need in the Church. In responding to their charisms, each developed a spirituality that reflects and supports their charism." Father Lucci submits that, "Any layperson desiring a deeper relationship with God would be wise to pursue the various spiritualties of the orders and congregations for one that might be helpful to her own temperament."

It seems reasonable then, that a person doesn't so much choose a spiritual path, but rather discovers a path that fits the best with personality, temperament and overall outlook on life.

So...what might be your unique path and what traditions within the church might be helpful to you on your journey of spiritual development?

Do you enjoy Scripture reading, formal prayers of the Church and have the gift of
hospitality? *Benedictine* spirituality may be for you. Founded by St. Benedict of Nursia
in the sixth century, the Benedictines are the oldest of the spiritual communities. His
"rule," or book of guidance, has been adapted and adopted by many other
communities over the centuries. The Benedictine answer to spirituality is the
Scriptures, the scriptural way of viewing the person and the world.

- Do you love to study and have a passion for explaining the faith through writing and speaking? Then consider the *Dominican* way. Scholars like St. Thomas Aquinas have shaped Catholic theology for centuries. Dominican spirituality derives from the reality that anything that is true points to God the Creator, and therefore all learning, knowledge and understanding ultimately teaches us about God. The more we know of God, the more we can love God. Consequently, Dominican spirituality begins with study, always with the question in mind: 'What more does this teach me about who I am and who God is in my life?'
- Does the simple life attract you? Do you want to see all of life as gift and all creatures as united in Christ? Then look to St. Francis and the Franciscan Way. Franciscan spirituality is "very simple and very personal and very devotional," explains Father Benedict Groeschel, C.F.R., "Devotional in that it is related to personal individual prayer to Christ and Our Lady and their presence in our life." Like its founder, the beloved Francis of Assisi, Franciscan spirituality stresses personal devotion to Christ, particularly to Christ in his incarnation, his passion and death and his presence in the Holy Eucharist.
- Do you long to know the will of God in all things? Is a straightforward, no-nonsense approach that finds God in the everyday things of life appealing? You may find Ignatian spirituality appealing. Founded by St. Ignatius of Loyola, the Society of Jesus, also referred to as the Jesuits, follow a spirituality focused on finding God in all things. According to Jesuit Father James Martin, "It is centered on the idea that the experiences of God are not reserved for one Sunday during Sunday Mass, but God can be found at every moment of our life and every moment we can experience God. All things that are part of our lives help us experience God." The Jesuit Way is "contemplative in action," he explains. "It's for the person who lives an active life, but maintains a contemplative life. If you are a young mother, Ignatian spirituality says that God can be found in your relationship with your children, your husband, your friends, preparing the sandwiches in the morning, in the office, in the struggles raising children, in the love you experience in raising your children in addition to the formal times you go to Church.
- Are you convinced that holiness is found in boardrooms and lunchrooms as well as
  chapels and churches? Consider the way of *Opus Dei*. "We are all called to holiness,"
  says John Cloverdale, law professor at Seton Hall University. "The supposition is that
  priests need a spirituality but we have the idea that laypeople are just called to muddle
  through. Actually, we are all called to holiness through different paths." Coverdale

explains that three points characterize Opus Dei. First, a stress on integrating the secular into one's spiritual life, rather than seeing everyday life as a problem to be overcome, it is part and parcel of where we are to sanctify ourselves. Second, an emphasis on work, understood broadly, as the whole range of activities, seen as a path to sanctity. God wants us to do it well and offer it to him. The first step is to do it and do it well. Third, a very strong stress on the reality of being sons and daughters of God that gives an optimistic and positive tone to love. God really does love us and is concerned about each of us.

It is my prayer for all of you that, whichever path you choose or whichever path chooses you, your journey of spiritual development helps you discover meaning and purpose in your life in addition to strengthening your relationship with God and with others.

May you know that God blesses you and all you do for God and Canada!

Continuing with the Constitution & Bylaws we are now on

#### PART IX: The League and the Church

#### Spiritual Advisor

- (a) Role
  - (i) The spiritual advisor, in cooperation with the chairperson of spiritual development, shall provide advice and guidance for the spiritual program. (Part VI)
  - (ii) The spiritual advisor shall receive due notice of all executive and council meetings and conventions and shall attend and participate in all such meetings and conventions, when possible, in an advisory capacity.
  - (iii) At national level, the spiritual advisor shall receive due notice of the national administrative committee meetings and shall attend and participate when possible.
- (b) Appointment
  - (i) The spiritual advisor of the parish council shall be the pastor of the parish. Where this is not possible, the pastor, in consultation with the council executive, shall appoint a spiritual advisor.
  - (ii) At other levels, the spiritual advisor shall be named by the appropriate level of the hierarchy.
  - (iii) A spiritual advisor may not serve simultaneously on any two levels above parish level.

### (c) Term of Service

.On levels other than parish, a spiritual advisor's term of service shall not exceed five years. The council concerned shall give six months advance notice of the expiry of a spiritual advisor's term to the authority responsible for naming a successor.

### Ministry to the Disabled

"But he said to me, 'My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness.'
Therefore I will boast all the more gladly of my weaknesses, so that the power of Christ may
rest upon me." Corinthians 12:9

The beauty of God's creation is all around us and most importantly in those suffering from disabilities. One in seven Canadians reported some form of disability that limits their daily activities. A disability is an impairment that may be cognitive, developmental, intellectual, mental, physical, sensory, or some combination of these. It may be present from birth or occur during a person's lifetime.

Disabilities related to pain, flexibility and mobility are the most common disabilities reported according to a Stats Canada survey in 2012. Mental health, dexterity and hearing disabilities were the next common, followed by seeing, learning and memory disabilities.

### Challenges facing people with disabilities:

- 1. Accessibility
- -hassles with public transportation, limited or non-existent
- -wheelchair accessible aisles in public areas
- -untrained or limited staff for wheelchair ramp assistance
- -non-disabled people using accommodations reserved for the disabled
- -accommodations in workplace
- 2. Communication
- -slights, misunderstandings, stares, patronized, hostility, intrusive inquiries
- -social life is diminished
- -humiliation when explaining nonvisible disability
- -assumption that all disabilities are similar
- -not aware of the limitations of their disabilities
- -having a disability is not a request for help
- 3. Discrimination & Harassment
- -37% of employees with disabilities have been harassed
- -substantial difference in wage earning
- -less chances for promotional opportunities at work
- -accused of being inebriated as not all disabilities are visual
- -cultural attitude that disabled people are not considered "normal"
- 4. Inclusion
- -not valued at work & feel they aren't an equal member of the team
- -less opportunities for proper job training
- -isolation within groups, ignore your presence
- -lack of upgraded or innovative tools/technology devices

- -embrace your children's curiosity
- -assuming the disability defines the person

**"I'm a person living with a 'disability' not a 'disabled person' or 'differently abled'."** Pamela Rae Schuller

### How can we as CWL members welcome and assist people with disabilities?

- Become aware of parish members with disabilities
- Support the families of the disabled, one on one communication
- Learn the individual needs of the disabled specialized equipment,
- Offer assistance with household chores, running errands, rides to appointments
- Listen to their encounter with Christ
- Talk about the value of suffering
- Build a parish education program that meets the needs of all the children, instead of a program for "special children"
- Encourage parish ministries
- Be proactive in protecting the lives of the disabled
- Advocate for disability services and benefits
- Donate to causes such as Special Olympics, The War Amps, CNIB etc.
- Write Resolutions to benefit the disabled
- Sponsor, volunteer or participate in events for the disabled

"Words and gestures to encounter people with difficulties cannot be amiss in parish life... because the encounter with the Risen Lord and the community itself can be a source of hope."

CWL members have the privilege of praying for those suffering from disabilities for their physical healing as well as for their spiritual growth and strength.

- Pray for their physical healing (Mark 1:29-34)
- Pray that God would comfort them (2 Corinthians 1:4)
- ♣ Pray that they would "grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ" (2 Peter 3:18)
- Pray that they would trust in the Lord and not lean on their own understanding (Proverbs 3:5)
- Pray that they would grow in the fruit of the Spirit (Galatians 5:22-23)
- Pray that they would suffer well. Pray that they would "commit themselves to their faithful Creator and continue to do good" (1 Peter 4:19)
- Pray that God would grant them endurance and encouragement (Romans 15:4-6)

- Pray that they would throw off sin and run with endurance. Pray that they would look to Jesus so that they do not grow weary and lost heart (Hebrews 12:1-3)
- Pray that the Lord would provide for all of their needs "according to the riches of his glory in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4:19)
- Pray that they would thirst for God and that they would place their hope in Him (Psalm 42:1-5)
- Pray that God would keep them in perfect peace (Isaiah 26:3)
- Pray that they would "be joyful in hope, patient in affliction, faithful in prayer" (Romans 12:12)
- ♣ Pray that God would enable them to be content in whatever circumstances He places them in (Philippians 4:11-13)
- ♣ Pray that they would hold unswervingly to the hope they have professed (Hebrews 10:23)
- Pray that they would not lose heart, but that they would persevere and fix their eyes on what is eternal (2 Corinthians 4:16-18)

### **Essential Guide to Safe Emailing**



#### **Benefits of Using BCC**

BCC stands for "blind carbon copy," and is a way of sending emails to multiple people without them knowing who else is getting the email. Any email addresses in the BCC field will be invisible to everyone else on the email. In other words, it's like CC, but for spies.

BCC allows you to hide recipients in email messages. Addresses in the "To:" field and the CC (carbon copy) field appear in the message, but users cannot see addresses of anyone you include in the BCC (blind carbon copy) field. Why is this important?

- 1) Privacy so you are not sharing the email address with others therefore protecting the privacy of the recipients.
- 2) You may not want everyone to be aware of others receiving the same message.
- 3) Emails are often forwarded without removing the address of previous recipients. As a result, messages repeatedly sent to many recipients may contain a long list of email addresses. Spanners and email-borne viruses may collect and target those addresses.

To reduce risk, encourage people who forward messages to you to use BCC so that your email address is less likely to appear in other people's in boxes and be susceptible to being harvested.

To avoid becoming part of the problem, in addition to using BCC if you forward a message, take time to remove all existing email addresses within the message. The additional benefit is that people you are sending the message to will appreciate not having to scroll through large sections of irrelevant information to get to the actual message.

To use BCC, enter the list of email addresses in the BCC field usually located below the "To:" field. You may leave the "To:" field blank or insert your email address making it easy to track the message. The goal is to use BCC: when sending bulk messages to protect the privacy of your recipients and to safeguard their address.

With all our concerns about Health and Homelessness The Catholic Bishops are disappointed at the passing of Bill C-45, that legalizes cannabis/marijuana for use- with knowing the risks to human society and health {physical, mental and emotional} and with knowing that it will be disastrous for many people. The Canadian Medical Association have put out that the use of cannabis is linked to addictions and depression. The position of the CCCB is shared by Pope Francis when he pointed out that "the legalization, even partial is very harmful. The soft drug can lead to harder drugs. All of these can lead to wide spread problems in our Society eg: mental health, crimes."

On Saturday November 3rd I attended The Parents Conference at Bishop Ryan High School in Hamilton, it started off with a Beautiful Eucharistic Celebration with Bishop Crosby. The theme this year was "Weaving the Catholic Partnership." The key note speaker was Allen Croxall, a Catholic Theologian and Educator by training. Now he is the President of Tools for Life. In collaboration with his business and education associates, Allen seeks to support teachers by providing practical, creative relationship building strategies and problem solving tools for children faced with daily trauma and uncertainty. Faith-filled learning is reinforced and extended in the home, the School and the Parish. The Tools for Life offers children the opportunity to build self-esteem, confidence and resilience for those times whenever the going gets tough. We are all called to seek the Lord where he may be found and live and love in His truth.

#### Care for our Common Home

Mother Teresa wrote "It is not how much we do, but how much love we put in the action that we do." We can reflect over the past year of our many blessings and what we learned and tried to do. Our many topics that we worked on were Homelessness, Palliative Care and Mental Health. I would like to touch on a few points on these subjects.

Mental Health:

The first one is putting care into the Mental Health Care. CBC Radio program stated that the North Bay Regional Health Care Centre has peer support workers helping patients in crisis. When they come to the emergency room, the support workers help during the down time, between assessment and admission. They help to keep the person calm. That makes the patient feels that they have a supportive person on their side. The support workers are experienced in education and their own experience. They help provide strategies for coping with day to day struggles with mental health issues. The support workers let them know that they are not alone and they can help. The nurses think the peer support workers are invaluable.

(Education and Health - Continued)

To learn more about peer support workers you can go to <u>cbc.ca</u>/white coat and hear Dr. Brian Goldman.

On January 30th Bell had Bell Let's Talk Day. It is about having the right tools to combat the stigma around mental health issues. Bell donated 5 cents for every application text, call, and tweet, toward Mental Health.

Palliative Care

There was a qualitative study on the level principles and practices to support spiritual care at the end of life. There are six principles that influence the organization of spiritual care.

- 1 Quality spiritual care incorporates the spiritual into every other aspect of hospice palliative care.
- 2 More profoundly then in any other area of care, quality spiritual care is guided and directed by the dying person and the family.
- 3 Hospice palliative care is fundamentally a vocation, and the work is inherently spiritual. Principals that enable a high quality approach to spiritual care by care providers.
- 4 Quality spiritual care requires care providers to allow spiritual questions and issues to emerge.
- 5 Spiritual care is also an act of "witnessing."
- Principles that enable the spiritual care practices of care providers.
- 6 Spiritual care includes rituals and times dedicated to marking transitions and processing experiences.

Quality spiritual care emphasizes that the role of volunteers, whose presence and work reinforces and ensures that hospice palliative care is grounded as vocational and spiritual.

#### **ONTARIO GOVERNMENT VISIT:**

You may recall a request I received from provincial this past fall, and forwarded to you to contact your MPP's and ask them to attend a CWL sponsored event at the Ontario Legislature on November 26, 2018. For example, several members contacted me seeking assistance in contacting their MPP's, to which I shared a copy of a letter that I had sent to my MPP to use as a template. I received follow-ups from members informing me that their MPP's replied, accepted the invite and thanked them for reaching out. This contact provided an opportunity for several councils to form a relationship with their MPPs.

I have had the pleasure to work with Joan Schurter, our Diocesan President and Catherine Feren, our Diocesan Spiritual Development Chairperson and First Vice-President, developing a proposal and action plan for our 2019 Diocesan Convention theme. The theme is "Welcome Home," and incorporates elements of our national theme "Care for Our Common Home", which is based on Pope Francis's Laudato Si. Our focus is to promote a welcoming environment for our members to thrive in, feel valued, loved, safe, protected and at peace. Promoting and embracing our mission to take action on social justice to protect and advocate for God's creation of our common home (the earth) and each other through compassion, kindness, respect and common dignity. Taking action as Legislation Chairpersons and as members of the CWL will help us to grow spiritually and become more mindful to be intentional disciples of Christ.


