

Hamilton Diocesan Council Report

- Our diocesan spiritual theme "Welcome Home" was incorporated with national theme "Care for our Common Home". We focused on caring for our earth so it is a welcoming home and striving to make our members feel more welcome, needed and wanted.
- Officers and regional teams made suggestions to implement the "Loneliness" theme into the diocesan theme, "Welcome Home", some of which will be implemented at a later date.
- In response to Pope Francis' encouragement that all people nurture and protect creation, thus making it a welcome home for all, we promoted: celebrating Earth Day on April 22nd with a focus on embracing the beauty and wonder of God's creation; taking the St. Francis Climate Pledge to Protect Creation; cleaning a community; and reflecting on preserving our water.
- Diocesan officers and regional teams have been grouped in groups of three to work together, to have a sounding board for ideas and to provide emotional and spiritual support.
- We updated our Hamilton Diocesan Policy and Procedure Manual.
- Our Lady of Good Counsel Bursary for Seminarians was renamed Our Lady of Good Counsel Vocations Fund to include applicants for religious life.
- We created an online diocesan reporting system for deceased members.
- Implemented Governance Presentations to teach fundamental principles of Constitution & Bylaws and the National Policy & Procedures manual
- Discussions with diocesan team members and spiritual advisor continued regarding roles and responsibilities of members and council spiritual advisors.
- Encouraged parish councils to implement suggestions received from other levels of the League, as per interest in their particular council.
- Met with regional chairs and discussed opportunities to work together drafting agendas, focus for meetings, consistency of messages in each region.
- Consulted and intervened with councils experiencing difficulties.
- Conducted several speaking engagements to Knights of Columbus/CWL councils receiving \$7384.70 in donations as a result.
- After much preparation for our diocesan 100th anniversary, the 100th anniversary dinner dance on April 18 and additional celebrations on June 20 were postponed.
- Our diocesan convention planned for May 29-31, included a banner at registration, readings and hymns reflecting both themes, hopefully a "Welcome Home" song, a candlelight vigil, and more. This too was cancelled.
- Further plans were made for the provincial convention at Crowne Plaza, Kitchener on July 4-8th, which was later cancelled due to COVID restrictions.
- Life Member, Georgina Bourke passed away on September 21, 2020. She was an activist for Human Trafficking Prevention, Sharing Fair, Environmental Protection, abolishing Nuclear Weapons etc. She will be greatly missed.

100th Anniversary

100 years of The Catholic Women's League of Canada in the Diocese of Hamilton. What an awesome achievement and a proud legacy that has been accomplished across the diocese. It is impossible to measure the work of the Holy Spirit in the League. Through God's grace, members have shared their gifts in their parish, community, diocese, province, across Canada and throughout the world.

And it all began when 15 women from different parishes met to discuss the advisability of forming a society to care for the religious needs of Catholic soldiers quartered in Hamilton and for the soldiers in sanatoriums and hospitals. It was called "The Catholic Women's Guild" with Rose Smith as President and Monsignor Mahony as Chaplain in 1917.

In June 1920, President Frances Lovering and Secretary Mrs. F.E. Regan were invited to attend a meeting held in Montreal for all the local societies from across Canada. This is where the National League came into existence with its own set of Constitution and By-laws.

After their return home, in September 1920, they asked that the name of the Catholic Women's Guild be changed to The Catholic Women's League and so it all began. We started with 11 sub-divisions (councils). Today we have 97 parish councils, 4 regions: Brant, Hamilton, Kitchener, North and 7,251 members.

The League became the public voice promoting Christian family values and upholding the life and dignity of human persons. We gathered 100,000 signatures in protest of abortion laws; distributed 35,000 pamphlets concerning the misleading impressions about adoption and placed 72 children in foster care.

We've raised awareness of the additive influence of pornography and its destructive effect on children, marriage and families through our "Pornography Hurts" campaign which was launched in 1996. Signs were posted on transit buses, billboards and letters/postcards sent to Members of Parliament.

We petitioned for larger school grants for Separate Schools, for an increase in family allowance, for raising the age of consent to 16 years and against sex education in the schools.

We've empowered women and children through becoming guide leaders for organizations like Girl Guides and Brownies. Encouraged the role of women in the church in lay ministry such as lectors, Eucharistic ministers, sacristans, ushers, facilitators, catechists, etc. Supported leadership opportunities by serving on school boards, hospital boards, teaching night school to new immigrants.

We've supplied surgical dressings to military hospitals, gave food and medicine to school kids, sewed masks and protective gowns for front line workers. Donated food, clothing, toiletries and collected 10,523 socks to combat homelessness. We supported organizations aimed at world peace, benefiting unwed mothers, palliative care and missions and much more.

Through our "Resolutions", we raised awareness on nuclear arms, elder abuse, acid rain, reduce-reuse-recycle, mental health, industrial wind turbines, and save the family farm. "Apostleship of the Sea" and Plastic Microbeads- The High Cost of Beauty were adopted at the National level.

We walked for peace in 1962, prayed at Martyr's Shrine in Midland, increased our devotion to Our Lady of Good Counsel through Marian retreats, vigils, and held virtual Rosary nights. We celebrate special Masses for our deceased members, World Day of Prayer, vocations to the Priesthood to name a few.

We resurrected phone trees, mailed cards/newsletters and communicated through emails, Zoom, GoToMeetings, Facebook, and Twitter. We kept in touch with our members and together prayed for the end to the world-wide pandemic of COVID-19.

This is just a small fraction of all the remarkable accomplishments the League has done over the past 100 years. Those members whose commitment to the objects of the League have left a lasting legacy of service. Let their stories and devotion, inspire you and encourage you to continue working to grow in faith and to witness to the love of God through ministry and service.

Membership is the strength and back-bone of our organization. Every Catholic Woman should be proud and anxious to enroll and serve under our banner – FOR GOD AND CANADA.

Filled with the wonder of Your presence within us, together we celebrate One Hundred Years of our organization in Canada.


We give thanks for the joyful ways You have graced us in our mission of Faith, Service and Social Justice.

In the world of today, as perhaps never before, the church needs an enlightened and faithful laity.



Georgina was an activist and participated in various committees such as International Campaign to Abolish Nuclear Weapons. She attended several workshops: Pro-life, Human trafficking prevention, Environmental protection, or how to save our planet earth.

Georgina was a woman of great Faith, a good friend to many and a dedicated member of the League who lived out her faith through her actions. She will be greatly missed by her Sisters in the League.

Serve in a Consultative Capacity

Approximately one-third of the parish council past presidents had been a member for more than 25 years with almost half falling in the 65 -74 year old age group. Overall, two-thirds attended executive and general meetings and spiritual events. Only a small percentage was called on for advice. The majority said their current presidents felt supported and encouraged by their help.

Be Responsible for Archives and History

The majority of past presidents were responsible for archives in their parish councils while a small number had a historian or an appointed member to assist. Their archives were stored in a Catholic Women's League room in their church with items in a cupboard, banker box or filing cabinet. These council archives were only reviewed as needed. The majority of the past presidents knew the whereabouts of their council charter. Pariah council historical archives included photo albums, scrapbooks, memory sticks, DVDs and CDs. The majority of the parish council's annual reports, Books of Life, financial information, membership renewal dates, executive and general meeting minutes and records of pins and awards were kept indefinitely.

Study and Implementation of the Constitution and Bylaws

One hundred percent of the parish councils that reported had a copy of the Constitution & Bylaws in their files. Most also had the National Manual of Policy and Procedure although they rarely referred to this manual to help with their own policies and procedures. Three quarters of the councils had their own parish council manual of policy and procedure, which was mostly updated when policies changed. Rarely was advice sought from diocesan, provincial and national executive or their spiritual advisor. Very seldom was advice sought from the life members. The past presidents checked the National and Provincial websites for information to share with their members.

Other duties as Assigned by the President

Very few past parish presidents were asked to perform other duties or to promote the League. One past president presented a 100th anniversary gift to a long-

standing member. A small number of past presidents checked national and provincial websites, prepared agendas, newsletters or correspondence. Some past presidents received in-service at various Regional meetings, took part in surveys and shared reports from the Canadian League magazine as well as presenting pertinent information at their general meetings. Some of the past presidents shared their knowledge of computers and worked on new ideas that came in from other levels.

Successes

Some parish councils planted a tree and mounted a plague on their church grounds to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the Catholic Women's League. Holding meetings in the daytime during winter months was a great success for a few parish councils when health regulations permitted. Many councils connected on Zoom to celebrate the recitation of the rosary.

Electronic newsletters and Zoom meetings kept the executive member active and present in the lives of their councils. A Catholic Women's League newsletter, mailed to all members on what they had accomplished in 2020 was well received. One parish council successfully created their own policy and procedure manual. Another parish council successfully held a fundraiser for their local Maternity Home in the form of a Musical variety show.

Challenges

Succession planning for future parish presidents was difficult for most parish councils. Many found balancing the needs of the parish Catholic Women's League and the recommendations of the National Catholic Women's League a challenge. It has been challenging trying to engage younger members to join their parish council and successfully having them assume a role on their executive. A great challenge was completing the national reports - the questions often did not pertain to the small community where they lived. Just knowing what is expected in their role presented a challenge for some and where to turn to receive this information.

Treasurer's Annual Report

This information was gathered from 33 of our 95 Catholic Women's League Parish Treasurers in the Hamilton Diocese. This represented one third of our parishes in this diocese.

Treasurers held position on the executive councils in 100% of parishes.

Bank statements (97%), cheque books (91%), deposit books (76%), ledger/columnar books (61%), and receipt books (24%) tended to be the tools of the treasurer. Some reported using technology in the form of Excel spreadsheets (42%) or computer programs (30%).

Signing of cheques was done by two of treasurer, president, recording secretary, past president, and/or correspondence secretary. [C&B 2013, Part XII, Section 5(c)]. Some councils reported having as many as 4 possible signatories.

Seventy-two percent of councils used a budget. This is up from last year's 61%. There was no question asked regarding whether the budget was presented to the parish council for approval [C&B 2013, Part XII, Section 5(e)]

Some treasurers (55%) had their books examined annually by an independent experienced bookkeeper or accountant. [C&B 2013, Part XII, Section 5(a)]

Membership fees were anywhere from \$22.00 to \$30.00

Donations to the National Voluntary Funds were as such:

- Catholic Missions in Canada: 0 \$600
- Coady International Institute: 0 \$300
- Euthanasia Prevention Coalition: 0 \$300
- Catholic Near East Welfare Association: 0 \$300
- National Bursary Fund: 0 \$100

Total Donations given to their Parish ranged from 0 - \$5,000.

Other Donations given under the direction of the various Standing Committees ranged from 0 - \$9,642.

Several Treasurers commented that this year was a very different year for fundraising due to COVID-19. All expressed that their total numbers were greatly impacted by the virus.

Spiritual Development Standing Committee Report 2020

Parish Councils reporting is representative of less than 1/4 of the Hamilton Diocesan Councils. 87% of reporting councils have Spiritual Development Chair positions filled. 65% of these positions were filled via an election. COVID-19 was a barrier for many councils in learning more about the national theme "*Care for Our Common Home*". In terms of the national theme, councils recited theme prayer at meetings, had a guest speaker, retreats, presentations, shared information from Diocesan and National, and took steps to be more environmentally friendly. One council discussed Laudato Si. Several councils celebrated the Feast of our Lady of Good Counsel virtually due to COVID-19 by promoting a prayer service/teaching/reflection I prepared for our parish councils in our diocese. Other activities included, a Facebook Mass and praying together. Other councils did not celebrate due to COVID-19.

Spiritual Growth of Members

- 68% of councils reported spending 1/3 of their meetings on spiritual growth programs and activities of members. 32% of councils reported that time constraints, heavy agendas and starting meetings with Mass prevented them from spending 1/3 of their meetings on spiritual growth of members.
- 44% of Spiritual Advisors sometime attend council meetings, 22% attend most of the time, 17% always attend, and 17% never attend.
- A couple of councils recognized their deceased members by arranging a special Mass for them. Another council organized an honour guard.
- Several liturgies and programs were cancelled due to the pandemic. Some councils utilized virtual methods to hold prayer services, Mass, prayer partners, meditation on Mother Mary, outreach to members, and included liturgies to begin their meetings.

Study of Catholic Teachings

- 83% of councils do not encourage their councils or members to study and discuss Catholic teachings in the church.
- No councils reported joining their parish liturgy committee, and 50% reported their church did not have a liturgy committee.

Role of Women in the Church

- 83% of councils do not encourage their councils or members to study and discuss the role of women in the church.
- 17% of councils encouraged women to be lectors, offertory bearers, Bible study, "Women at the Well" talk, Inspirational Women's Series.
- 61% of councils took on leadership roles in the church.

Evangelization and Mission Assistance

- 50% of councils participate in other Missions. 38% recite special prayers, 24% organize rosaries, and 13% had a Home Missions guest speaker.
- Councils donated to CMIC, others did not due to COVID-19. Donations were made to the Good Shepherd, St. Vincent de Paul Society, Canadian Food for Children, Adopt a Family in Kenya, MaterCare, and a Hospice.

Lay Ministries

- 58% of Parish Spiritual Development Chairs reported that they participate in lay ministries as Eucharistic ministers, 53% as lectors, 37% in choir, 32% decorating, 32% in hospitality, 26% as facilitators, 21% as sacristans, 21% as ushers, and 11% as catechists.
- Councils who participate and lead/organize (in bracket) lay ministries: 100% lectors (63%), 91% Eucharistic ministers (56%), 91% choir (44%), 91% decorating (50%), 73% hospitality (50%), 32% facilitators (19%), 73% sacristans (44%), 77% ushers (19%), and 55% catechists (13%).

Ecumenism and Interfaith Endeavours

- 59% 91% of councils did not reach out to women of other denominations or faiths to invite them to initiate a joint prayer service, attend a meeting, social event, as joint speaker, or for fellowship of the Least Coin.
- 27% of councils participated in ecumenical activities. 10% of councils participated in interfaith group activities, such as world day of prayer.

Chairperson's Report

The pandemic in 2020 was a challenge for all. Many councils were unable to meet, but several councils found creative ways of staying connected with members using technology. Many councils reported to have benefited from diocesan level support through my guidance and teachings on Catholic theology/reflections/prayers; especially during Advent, Lent, Holy Week, Easter, Divine Mercy, Feast of Our Lady of Good Counsel, and other Marian Themes, solemnities and feast days. Councils also found resources from National and Provincial helpful. I will continue to provide support to councils.

Recommendations

• Councils believe that direction for this portfolio should come from the Diocesan Spiritual Development Chair. I would support this through diocesan in person training and webinars for councils on how to prepare and lead prayers, spiritual retreats, spending 1/3 of meetings on spiritual growth.

• More emphasis is needed on studying the role of women in the church.

• Timely dissemination of information through the proper channels of communication (National-Provincial-Diocesan-Parish and vice-versa).

- Christian Family Life Chairpersons reported 79% positions were filled, 73% elected and 27% appointed. Years of service: 42% had 25 years, 33% had 6-10 years, 8% had 11—15 years, 8% had 5 years and less; 50% previously held this position.
- The age of members: 36% were age 55-64, 27% were 65-74, 18% were 45-54, and 18% were 75-84

Marriage and Family

- Family enrichment programs promoted this year included: Marriage Preparation 7%, Marriage Encounter Weekend 7%
- Support for people suffering from domestic abuse 21%

- Environmental issues addressed were: recycling (9), reduce the use of styrofoam cups (7), other topics (7), eliminate plastic water bottles (6), reduce paper use (6), eliminate plastic straws (5), green bins for organic waste (4), reduce water use (3, other (3), compost (1), and roadside or community clean-up (1).

Genetics

- Knowledge in regard to the advantages and disadvantages of technology to alter genes in light of the teaching of the Catholic Church was rated as: good (6), poor (4), very good (2,) fair (2). Topics to learn more about were: genetics, senior health, what programs available to them through the diocese, mental health postcards and The Canadian Catholic Bioethics Institute newsletter.
- Other council activities included: local Little Royal Winter Fair, elementary school division donation, Most Improved Student Award to grade eight student, Citizenship Award to high school graduate, grocery sales tapes collected for local Catholic elementary school, and bibles to the grade five students at the beginning of their school year which are their school bibles that stay at the school until they graduate or relocate.



Resolutions Standing Committee Report

Diocese: Hamilton Sub-chairpersons: N/A Parishes Reporting: 15/97 Chairperson: Camille L. Naranjit

In Hamilton Diocese, Catholic Women's League reports were received from 15 parishes. Five councils have resolution chairs, and in all councils the resolutions chair shares the role with legislation. Three of the resolution/legislation chairs were elected and two of the chairs were filled by council appointment.

Challenges

The reported biggest challenges to getting people for this position are trying to generate interest, and deciding on a topic to study at length to write a resolution on. The three reasons for not writing resolutions given were that there is no chairperson or leadership, parishes were unsure of the actual research brief process, and they had no issues to write resolutions.

Unique to this year, in the League, this past year was full of challenges as the world experienced a pandemic. Due to lockdowns and the inability to meet, most council did not hold meetings (or, if they did they only had one or two and they were very poorly attended.) As such there was no opportunity to examine resolutions regularly and brainstorm ideas for resolutions.

Research and Preparation of Resolutions and Briefs

This year, one council had success by discussing an action plan to review the 2019 resolutions and discuss how they could contribute to the resolution regarding the state of Long Term Care in Ontario. (In particular, the lack of beds, the lengthy system of patient allocations and the lack of care and need for more thorough patient-centred care.) This plan however got stalled due to meetings not being held. The council hopes to continue with this initiative when meetings start up again.

Four councils wrote federal or provincial governments, three signed petitions, and two arranged to have a guest speaker. When chairs, contacted their local, provincial and federal government representatives, most used letters or email and none contacted them by phone or in person. One council reported having a letter writing session. Three chairs referred to communiqués, and annual reports for information. Two councils discussed ideas for resolutions and three studied issues that might become resolutions in the future.

It was reported that one council went to a Catch the Fire or S'Mores workshop for their member's own development. Additionally a council on World Water Day, March 22, 2020 had a hands-on activity that surveyed parish members on how they conserve water in their homes and then group sharing of ideas took place.

Study and Implementation of Resolutions Adopted by Other Levels

A few councils had one or two meetings to review 2019 resolutions in 2020. Resolutions that councils were passionate about were: long-term care, youth mental health and access to healthcare. One council chose to examine and act upon the provincial resolutions having to do with euthanasia, pregnancy crisis centre for those who do not choose abortion, and spousal abuse. There were no diocesan resolutions for 2019 so there were no resolutions to act upon. Three councils were aware of the National resolutions from the website <u>www.cwl.ca</u>.

Legislation Standing Committee Report

Diocese: Hamilton Sub-chairpersons: N/A Parishes Reporting: 15/97 Chairperson: VACANT

In Hamilton Diocese, 15 parishes filled out the Catholic Women's League reports. Six councils have legislation chairs and all were elected.

Monitored and Studied Legislation

All councils knew the names of their local, provincial and federal government representatives and the majority (5 out of 6) receives mailings from them. One chair attended a public municipal city council forum and took information back to their council. All legislation chairs rate their knowledge of government issues at all three levels as either "well informed" or "somewhat informed". Three chairs made use of Hansard Transcripts to learn about current legislation.

The majority of councils (10 of 15) were aware of Bill C-7: an act to amend the *Criminal Code of Canada*" related to medical assistance in dying (MAID). One of the councils reported on carrying out a letter writing campaign to get their Catholic voices on the issue of MAID heard by the government. Nine councils were aware of both Bill C-13: the COVID-19 Emergency response Act, and Bill C-14: COVID-19 Emergency response Act, No. 2. Regarding Bill C-15: the Canadian Emergency Student Benefit Act, about half of respondents knew about it. The majority of councils (10 of 15) reported they were not aware of Bill C-71: Act to Amend Certain Acts and Regulations in Relations to Firearms.

In the main, councils did not monitor any Bills as they had no meetings in 2020. However, one council examined the federal Bill C-3: *An Act to Amend the Judges Act* whereby judges must take special units of training on sexual assault matters and myths in order to keep practicing as a judge. Furthermore, this council advocated for over 2 years and worked with Rona Ambrose to get her private members bill passed and given Royal Assent and then celebrated their successes.

Regarding provincial legislation, councils examined both long term care issues related to 2019 resolutions and a council advocated for better palliative care and held a prayer vigil for it. A council also monitored the We Charity scandal and prorogation of Parliament.




Due to Covid-19 in 2020, we were able to:






2020 was an unusual year!

1st Hamilton Diocesan President



Frances Lovering, the First Hamilton Diocesan President from 1920 – 1923 was an active member of St. Joseph's and St. Mary's Parish churches in Hamilton where she had been Parish President.

Frances Lovering along with Miss Florence Barker helped organize the Catholic Women's Guild of Hamilton in 1917 to care for the religious needs of Catholic soldiers. This Guild was later formed into the Catholic Women's League of Hamilton Diocese in September 1920.

Frances became the 1st National CWL Treasurer in 1920. In 1923 – 1925, Frances was elected the National CWL President.

For Frances the CWL provided a public voice on matters that affected all women and Catholics in particular. She became an advocate for humane and social welfare; formed a branch of Secours National that sent trucks, cases of food, clothing and hospital supplies to soldiers and their families in France; organized aid to the underprivileged in France; provided aid to the elderly, ill and physically disabled travelers, and volunteered for social agencies such as Big Sisters' Association, Children's Aid Society etc.

Frances received the Medal of Honor (1917) and Medal of Reconnaissance Francaise (1921) from the French government for her work on behalf of Secours National; for her religious work the papacy gave her the Medal Pro Ecclesia et Pontifice (1925) and Mesaglia Benemerenti (1926). Shortly after her death (March 26, 1926) she was made a chevalier of France's Legion of Honour, the only woman in Canada to have been granted this tribute.

A "Frances Lovering Bursary" was established in 1996 at St. Jerome' University. For our 75th anniversary year of the League, a memorial gravestone marker was placed at Frances' gravesite in Hamilton.


