

The news that virtual meetings will become an official part of the National Policy & Procedures Manual and the motions will no longer need to be ratified is welcome indeed. Hopefully this, will open up the doors of communication for those councils that have trouble meeting in climatic weather.

With the upgrade of the National website, the 70 + resources from the Strategic Planning Committee available online, and a mentor's data skills bank in the works, the League is reaching out to parish councils all across Canada. Please take the time to ponder on some of these fabulous new resources.

The National Unity Outreach Project presentations will begin again in the fall months. If your Council has not been scheduled for a visit, please contact me at president@cwlhamilton.ca

The feedback from the members has been tremendous and has generated some great ideas for the diocesan, provincial, and national councils to address and to take action. You will see some of these results over the next few months/years.

For the second year, the Provincial Council has asked each Diocesan Council to have a "Go Make A Difference" project. It was decided by the diocesan executive to continue with the "Community Service Project for the Youth" but, by having Parish Councils include their local schools (elementary, high school or both) with the project in some way. I am sure that Councils will plan some very interesting and creative ways to connect with the students all across the diocese. You will find information on the "Community Service Project for the Youth" later in the newsletter.





There are so many possibilities and ideas to consider as you "organize" for the winter months. Be sure to spend some quality time with Our Lord and Our Lady of Good Counsel in silence, reflection and in praying the Rosary.

One book that you might like to read is "The Prayers & Personal Devotions of Mother Angelica" by Raymond Arroyo, especially the section on "The Rosary from the Heart". This is a quote from Mother Angelica,

In recent years, there has been a great amount of discussion done on poverty. Many organizations around the globe have tried their best to eradicate poverty and its effects on societies and countries. Right now, it seems that poverty is an integral, inescapable part of human society for poverty is affected by human greed and selfishness.

Scriptures in a way seem to praise poverty. "Blessed are the poor (in spirit)"
Though the sacred authors extol the life of poverty, their emphasis differ in many ways. Luke challenges the socio-physical poverty, while Matthew looks at poverty to transcend into spiritual wellbeing. Is poverty desirable for the sacred writers?

Not at all. We need to fight and overcome every form of poverty.

The modern world suffers not only from the physical poverty but, many other kinds of poverty. Mother Teresa of Calcutta explained a different kind of poverty she experienced in the developed nations. She observed in England, in one of the nicest houses for the aged, run by her congregation, which was equipped with the modern facilities, that the inmates were not happy. Several of them looked depressed and constantly looking at the door waiting for someone to appear. When she inquired about their sullen faces, one of the sisters replied that these people were suffering from loneliness. Every day they would wait for their loved ones to visit them. But nobody would come to see them. Yet, they did not stop waiting for the family members to visit them.

The deepest poverty is loneliness and feeling unloved. These types of poor people are amidst us - they live among us. We see people being abandoned by their own family members — spouses, children, and friends. This is an awful poverty. They don't need our money, but charity of time. They don't need clothes or food, but a few kind words...

Dear League Sisters,

Be sure to make time for yourselves to enjoy the simple things in life, such as spending some time in nature and listening to the peace of silence. Breathe in the freshness of the cooler evening air, and admire the glorious scenery as the leaves begin to change into vibrant autumn colours.

As many parish councils return from a well-deserved summer break and resume League meetings and activities, the fall provides a great opportunity for Presidents Elect/Vice Presidents/Organization Chairwomen to organize council memberships, plan future League development and leadership training opportunities for their members, plan and prepare for membership drives, and welcome back their members. It is my hope that you were able to savour some moments and opportunities for self-development and reflection over the warm summer months. Whether it was done through prayer, studies, life experiences, or in the stillness of God's presence and peace, I trust that it was meaningful and uplifting. May you return to League business rejuvenated with the Holy Spirit and know that you are God's masterpieces, created in Jesus Christ for a divine purpose, which is to engage in good works that glorify our Creator. God gave each of us gifts and talents to benefit others, not ourselves. May

you use your God given gifts and talents for the glory of God, helping others, and improving the world around you, all for the advancement of God's kingdom. May your blessed gifts and talents enhance the role of women in the church and society, recognizing the human dignity of all people, while defending Christian education and values, and contributing to the understanding and growth of religious freedom, social justice, peace, harmony, and love for one another. Together, may we grow in faith, and witness the love of God through ministry and service.

In this communique, I will continue to share helpful information on leadership development and organization (membership). As a Woman Leader, and more importantly, as a Catholic Women Servant Leader, my focus on leadership will be through the lens of a Catholic Women's Transformational Leader.

While continuing with the leadership trait of integrity, I introduce another leadership trait – **WISDOM**, and continue to incorporate and relate these teachings and resources to our League patroness, Our Lady of Good Counsel, so to help demonstrate our Blessed Mother Mary as woman leader model.

OUR BLESSED MOTHER AS WOMAN LEADER MODEL:

Our Blessed Mother Mary teaches us true Wisdom in all its fullness. Her heavenly instruction to put on the mind of Christ, to know all things in Him, to love all things in Him, to see all things in His divine radiance, to be Christ like. This is the true Wisdom which Our Lady practiced and now teaches each of us. She points us in the direction of Her Son, and to do whatever Jesus tells us.

Mary shows us the path to God, teaching us to invite and embrace the Holy Spirit into our lives and in all we do. This is known as mystical wisdom. Our Blessed Mother alone perfectly traveled the path of mystical wisdom. It was the Holy Spirit who came upon her and thus embraced her with a perfect union with God. Upon receiving this union, she understood it, and was eager to communicate it to us. Listen to Mary's instruction and allow the Spirit of Wisdom to work in you freely. Mary wants each of us to be entirely inflamed by the Holy Spirit, Her Spouse, in order that we might desire communion with God and receive it, especially in the Holy Eucharist where we received Wisdom Incarnate Himself. It is in this Sacrament of Love, worthily received, that Our Lady wants to bring us to "taste and see" that loving union with her beloved Son, our Lord Jesus Christ.

Mary is a woman and is God's chosen leader who sits on the Throne of Divine **Wisdom**. Eternal **Wisdom** dwells within her, and she can intercede for us in order to lead us to God. Mary is the Mother of Divine **Wisdom**, as it was through her YES that the Second Person of the Trinity, Jesus Christ, became our Brother and Saviour. Mary is the Mistress of Divine **Wisdom**, as she is the Lady of the house of God and Mother of God's Holy family.

Our blessed Mother Mary is Our Lady of **Wisdom** who connects us with her Son through her relationship to the eternal and incarnate **WISDOM – Christ Jesus!**

As women and as leaders, we continue to learn from the many attributes and virtues by which Mother Mary lived and how her teachings can journey us towards holiness and to God. Do as Jesus did and call on our Lady of Good Counsel for guidance and **wisdom**. Mary counselled Jesus throughout his entire life, and she championed Him, even when others attacked Him. Mary faced adversity and hatred with grace and always did what was right, no matter how difficult it was to do the right thing. That is integrity and the foundation of good leadership!

The following is from my May 2023 communique, which is relative to this submission and thus worth repeating:

Jesus respected Mary greatly and looked to her for counsel, for He trusted her and believed in her gifts and wisdom. We, too, must, learn to respect and trust in the gifts and **wisdom** of each other for counsel and support. When we do this, we build each other up, and strengthen our councils and League.

Mary's courage, hard work, faith and trust in God is what allowed her to see her leadership role through a lens of hope and love. May you each embrace that same vision, and respond to the call to serve as Mary did! For help in doing this, the following is a prayer for guidance and **wisdom**. "Holy God of heavenly **wisdom**, you have given us Mary, Mother of Jesus, to be our guide and counsellor. Grant that we may always seek her motherly help and good counsel in this life, and so enjoy her blessed presence in the life to come. Amen"

LEADERSHIP:

Wisdom is the gift from God to judge and guide correctly. We gain **wisdom** through experience and by following God's and our Lady's counsel. Without God's and Mary's help, we do not have true **wisdom**.

As mentioned in my May 2023 communique, learning is a lifelong journey, and sharing what one learns is the first step in being a good leader. Proverbs 2:6-7 – "For the Lord gives **wisdom**; from his mouth come knowledge and understanding; he stores up sound **wisdom** for the upright; he is a shield to those who walk in **integrity**."

A wise leader knows that people are the key to an organization or team success and they work to empower others. Championing and supporting your team members builds long-term loyalty, trust, credibility, commitment, and morale in your team, and it gives your team members a confidence boost. It builds love and long lasting relationships. It also demonstrates servant-ship when your focus is on each team member's wellbeing and interests, rather than on yourself.

The following are three ways to become wise:

- 1) Rely on facts, not assumptions, third hand information, or gossip. Most people make assumptions without realizing the damage it can cause to a relationship or the reputation of the person being talked about. If someone talks poorly about someone behind their backs, in all likelihood, they are talking poorly about you as well. Do not listen to gossip, as its intent is to hurt, divide people, and damage reputations and relations. The bible labels gossips as untrustworthy and meddlesome. Use wisdom and form your own perspectives based on facts. Making assumptions and/or false allegations against someone can lead to larger and serious issues.
- 2) Address issues from a first-principles concept. This is a concept of taking an issue, identifying, and challenging the assumptions based on fact. This can only be done by bringing all parties together at the same table so that truth can come forward and be known at the same time in the presence of all parties. By acting in this manner, it allows you to separate the issue into fundamental principles in order to work towards a solution for moving forward.
- 3) Never ignore an issue and/or conflict. A good servant leader always puts the wellbeing of others first; thus she makes time to address issues and/or conflicts. A good leader also makes it her responsibility and priority to address issues and/or conflicts should they arise, recognizing that if problems are left to fester, they can damage team bonds, sometimes irretrievably. On the other hand, when leaders confront issues quickly and directly, they can build a positive environment in which a team feels respected and appreciated.

Good servant leaders put others before them, make time for people, choose courage over comfort, choose what is right over what is easy, and choose to <u>practice their values rather than simply profess them</u>. These are leaders with integrity! Integrity is the most important quality of a good leader. Having integrity and **wisdom** will allow you to learn from your mistakes, and become a respected and loved servant leader.

Wisdom is knowing to "stay in your own lane" and ensuring others do the same. It is important to establish boundaries and not create walls in relationships. These maintain healthy relationships, allow for honest disclosure of feelings, and respect the emotions of all. Walls are impersonal, prohibit intimacy, and arise upon anger/conflict. When we have clear boundaries, we permit ourselves respect, and demonstrate respect for others. Clear, well-established boundaries are absolutely essential in our relationships with others, whether those relationships are at home with our family, in the League or elsewhere. Boundaries tell others that you respect yourself and that they must as well. It is important to know the difference between putting up walls and setting boundaries. "Walls keep everyone out. Boundaries teach people where the door is." (Mark Groves)

What would happen if vehicles didn't stay in their own lanes? There would be chaos and people would get hurt. The same applies when working in groups such as an executive. It is important that we not step on each other's toes, and instead support and respect the boundaries of each other's portfolios.

The same respect applies when offering suggestions, advice, or corrections. These are best done in private, so to avoid the potential of causing someone upset or humiliation. When members on an executive or committee make suggestions, comments, or ask questions that could be perceived to go beyond their duties or responsibilities/portfolios, it can result in conflict, confusion and undermining.

Communication between two or more people is always personal, even if it is about the League or another entity. The manner in which you communicate with each other makes a huge difference. The golden rule states that relationships always involve human dignity. No one likes to be corrected in front of others or accused of something they did not do. As mentioned, if a person feels called out, shamed, or falsely blamed, the fallout could be damaging to the person and the organization. It is also important to allow a person to "save face" when a tense situation arises. This demonstrates respect for one's personal dignity.

No one else should be providing direction or information on topics that fall under someone else's portfolio. This will not only ensure that correct information is provided, it will also ensure accountability, clear lines of communication, and will build respect and trust within team councils. Requests that come to you for information that falls under another officer's or chairperson's portfolio, should be redirected to the correct person.

If you have a suggestion or information that you believe could be helpful to a team member, share your suggestions or information in private, and respect if or how that person uses/or does not use your suggestions or information. It is important to be mindful that people need the freedom and support to learn and grow, even if that means making the odd mistake here and there. It is also important to remember that we all have our own ways of doing things. Change is innate and can be rewarding if you allow it and support it. Remember, just because someone is doing things differently, it does not make it wrong. It is only wrong if it violates our governing documents or the law of the land.

Staying in your lane can provide benefits of learning to respect the contributions of others, and learning to feel good about yourself for supporting and not overstepping. Also, you no longer bring as much judgement and negativity into your relationships, and can practice humility and patience. By staying in your own lane, you allow love and trust to consume your relationships, and feel better about working as a team, being around people, and people will feel better about working with and being around you.

It is the responsibility of each member and particularly the Council President, to ensure that members are "staying in their own lanes" in order that the team remains respectful and supportive of one another. I encourage members to go back and re-read my earlier newsletter communiques on leadership, and refer to them as resources.

MEMBERSHIP/RECRUITMENT/MAINTENANCE/TRANSFERS:

Membership and Maintenance:

Welcoming members back in September is a perfect time to organize and update your membership listing and prepare for a fall membership drive, keeping in mind that membership fees are <u>due by January 1st</u>, in accordance with the League's Constitution and Bylaws Part SVIII: Section 4 (a). Ensure that you have correct and complete information for each member, and remember to be mindful of the Freedom of Information and Protection and Privacy Act when collecting and storing member's information. The Organization Chair is accountable for safeguarding a member's personal information, which includes their email address, phone number, home address, or anything else that could identify the member. Such information must be protected and only shared for the operational purposes of the council. Members must be advised and consent to how their information will be used and who will have access to it. Also, copies of membership information in your possession shall be securely handed off to your successor or destroyed upon completion of your term. The same applies to any other executive completing their terms and who have in their possession membership information.

I am re-sharing the following information as a helpful reference with respect to membership:

Recruitment:

I have been working with many councils on membership drives. Membership drives should be an ongoing activity throughout the year. There is no greater welcome than a personal invitation so, I encourage members/councils to extend warm personal invitations to parishioners and all women 16 years of age and older. The League is also an opportunity to evangelize and convert. In addition to bulletin announcements, have members present before and after Mass and other church events to welcome women, promote the League, and invite them to a meeting or League event. Hold League socials or events with themes and/or guest speakers. Contact me if you are looking for some ideas.

Many councils break for the summer months to spend time with family, friends and nature. Consider hosting a welcome back social in the fall for existing members and encourage them to bring a friend. Place an announcement in your parish bulletin and invite all women of the parish to attend. Make it fun, faithful and fulfilling! There are many resources on our National website to promote the League. I encourage you to visit the site and use these promotional materials.

Maintenance:

Membership maintenance is just as important as membership recruitment. Current members appreciate reminders of when membership fees are due, when meetings and events are taking place, and the personal touch of reaching out and checking in. Up-to-date council records makes for a well-organized council. Try to process membership information in a timely manner. Keeping the lines of communication open is important to keeping members invested in their League membership. Be sure to respect and recognize members. One way is through recognition and awards. The League offers several awards which councils can honour members.

Some awards include:

- Nomination for the Frances Lovering Woman of the Year Award
- Bellelle Guerin Award
- A Maple Leaf Service Pin
- Certificates of Merit

Membership Transfers:

When a member transfers from one council to another, a membership transfer form must be completed and signed from the council from which the member is transferring. The form includes the member's name, ID number, the name of the council from which the member is coming, the name of the president and the name of the Spiritual Advisor, the year the member joined the League, a list of offices the member held on parish council executive and the year (s), the last year the member paid their membership, and the member's contact information. The form is signed by the president and the organization chair. This information is important and follows a member, should she transfer to another council (s). The member is to present the completed and signed membership transfer form to their new council, who shall use the information for their records and advise National of the membership transfer. The membership transfer form can be found on the National website under the 500 series.

LEADERSHIP TRAINING AND WORKSHOPS:

It is my pleasure to support members in their roles, whether it be a general member, executive, or both. I encourage you to reach out to me, especially new presidents and other executives should you have any questions about the League, League development, leadership training, membership, etc... I will continue to offer presentations and workshops on League development and leadership training.

I encourage all members to learn about the League and their roles as members and those serving on an executive. Visit the National website to download and read the League's governing documents, attend League meetings, conventions, League and leadership development opportunities, and ask questions. The League's Constitution & Bylaws (C&B) and National Policy & Procedures (P&P) have been updated and can be found on the National website at www.cwl.ca. I am happy to report that National will be

producing a printed copy of the new C&B, which is scheduled to be ready by fall/winter 2023.

OTHER HAPPENINGS:

May 2023

- A Hamilton Parish Council and their Spiritual Advisor invited me to speak about the League one weekend following each of their Masses, as part of their membership campaign. Their efforts generated new memberships.
- I attended and presented at the Hamilton Diocesan CWL Annual Meeting of Members/Convention

June 2023

- A Hamilton Parish Council invited me to speak about the League as part of parishioner's event for their Parish Priest/Spiritual Advisor.
- I was invited, along with my family to attend an Ordination service.

July 2023

I attended the Provincial Annual Meeting of Members/Convention in Cornwall,
 Ontario, as one of the Accredited Delegates for the Hamilton Diocesan Council.

August 2023

- I attended the National Annual Meeting of Members/Convention in Saint John, New Brunswick as one of the Accredited Delegates for the Hamilton Diocesan Council. One of my roles as Diocesan President-Elect and Organization Chair is to prepare a report following my attendance at National Convention and share my report with you at the Fall Regional Meetings. I look forward to seeing you and sharing my report.
- I was invited to attend a Consecration to Saint Francis de Sales ceremony. It was the first to take place in Canada. It was a lovely celebration within a Sunday Mass.

FUN FACTS:

Did you know that the month of September is World Candle Month? The candle symbolizes Christianity as the light represents the presence of Jesus' coming into our world. The candle is used in worship as a symbol of Jesus' among those gathered in His name; and the two candles on the alter are to remind us that Jesus came into our lives as both human and divine. The candle also represents the presence of the Holy Spirit among us, and the flickering flame is a reminder that although, we cannot see Him, the Holy Spirit dwells among and within us. In the Bible, the candle is a symbol of holiness, goodness, knowledge, wisdom, grace, HOPE, and God's promise of life eternal. Candles are also used in prayer services for the deceased to remind us of God's promise to His faithful (that there is life after death).

May the Light of Christ and the beauty of the Lord be upon you and may the work of His hands be mimicked in all you do in service to God and all of God's creation.

IN CLOSING:

Thank you for your continued prayers for my daughter Amanda and myself as we continue our difficult breast cancer journeys. I prepared this communique at my daughter's hospital bedside this past week. It is times like these that regular check-ins, cards, and words of encouragement mean so much. Exciting changes happening at National as they adopt the new strategic plan!

Newly elected National Secretary-Treasurer, Dorothy Johansen's Communique #01 & #02 dated August 30, 2023 have been sent to both your Council President and Secretary or are available by going onto the National website (cwl.ca) highlighting "Act" on the home page and scrolling down to "Communiques".

Dorothy's communiques will be focused on providing oversight for the League and making recommendations.

In her first communique, Dorothy points out that the largest budget item that National has is the "National Development Fund" (Form 512). Application deadline for funding is **September 30, 2023** by emailing the completed form to executivedirector@cwl.ca with your intent.

In her second communique, Dorothy wishes to make members aware that funds are available through the "National Bursary Fund" (Form 552). This fund is used to provide financial assistance to members needing it to pursue studies, courses, seminars, conferences, workshops, and diploma/degree programs that align with and promote the "Objects of The Catholic Women's League of Canada".

On another note... We have been made aware that some councils have not sent in their collected memberships for not only 2023, but from previous years. Funds collected MUST be remitted to National in a timely manner so, as to avoid fraudulent charges.

I have just a few information pieces to share with you in this issue of the Spectrum.

On Monday September 25, 2023, there will be a virtual ZOOM Lecture Series on "Addressing Food Insecurity". This Moira Ste. September is Arthritis Awareness Month. Arthritis affects a great portion of our population (1 in 5 over 15 yrs. old and half the population over 65 yrs. old). Everyone feels pain differently but, arthritis can be very debilitating for some persons. Managing pain is also very personal. Some may use pain pills to be able to function while others use a more holistic approach such as exercising (which releases endorphins), eating well (remember the plate portions of ¼ protein, ¼ whole grains and ½ veggies), heat/cold therapy (heat relaxes muscles and cold reduces inflammation), and mindfulness meditation (which can distract the mind

from the pain and focus on breathing). More information can be found at the Arthritis Society website.

Both September and October are concerned with some type of cancer. September is Ovarian and Prostate Cancer Awareness Month and October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month. One can reduce one's risk of cancer by using sunscreen when going out, not smoking, eating nutritious food, having a healthy body weight, minimizing intake of alcohol, no enough exercise. Also, one should get screened every couple of

and getting enough exercise. Also, one should get screened every couple of years. If cancer can be discovered early, it may be cured. More information can be found at the Cancer Society website.

October is also Social Isolation Awareness Month. As you are aware Ionliness can lead to feelings of depression and anxiety. Try to reach out to someone this month who may be feeling alone. Greet a neighbour. Try to connect with someone you know who is feeling unwell. None of us is an island (I am paraphrasing John Donne). We all need someone.

The federal government is asking citizens their opinions in order to support the development of a Safe Long-Term Care Act. There is an online questionnaire at https://www.canada.ca/en/health-canada/programs/consultation-safe-long-term-care.html which you may fill in to give your ideas. The questionnaire **must** be submitted by Sept. 21, 2023.

The bill for medical assistance in dying received Royal Assent on Mar. 9, 2023. It is now the law in Canada. The date for those suffering only from a mental illness was postponed till Mar. 17, 2024. This delay was thanks to many persons including the Canadian Conference of Bishops which sent out a statement expressing that "we remain profoundly concerned about, and strongly disagree with the expansion of the 'eligibility criteria' for euthanasia and assisted suicide (i.e., 'Medical Assistance in Dying' or 'MAID') to persons whose sole medical condition is a mental illness..." found More information can be at https://www.cccb.ca/wpcontent/uploads/2023/05/2023-05-05-Open-letter-to-Government MAIDfinal.pdf.

- The Fall 2022 Resolutions Webinars were well attended, and the last Webinar was recorded on Zoom. It is available for you to share as a presentation to members at a meeting or as a personal resource. IF YOU WOULD LIKE THE LINK and Power Point Slides supporting the presentation, please contact Mary Helwig-Hall at <u>resolutionscwlhamilton@gmail.com</u> You should have received the information from your regional Chair, and you can also find it in the Spectrum Reports. These are posted on the Hamilton Diocesan Website for your reference.
- It is now time for "The next steps". The first Webinar got us as far as developing a working resolution. The working statements were:
 - 1. St. Patrick's, Hamilton- That City of Hamilton provide washroom facilities for the homeless.
 - 2. St. Mark's, Kitchener that the CRTC & OLG provide clear warning disclaimers or limits to the recent On-line gambling advertising on TV and social media.

"NEXT STEPS" is designed to take us through the DIFFICULT but necessary task of bringing the resolution to the Convention floor in 2024, IF the respective councils still wish to do so. Why? Well, there's good news to report.

In the case of St. Patrick's resolution- our Provincial Resolutions Chair recommended that St. Patrick's approach their local City officials and make their case. In a wonderful turn of events, our local City of Hamilton Mayor, Andrea Horwath, when interviewed by McLean's laid out some of the changes made to support the homeless. A link to the article will be included

in the Spectrum report but, I'll read a short summary of the plan:

"Canada's homelessness crisis went from bad to worse during the pandemic years, as encampments popped up in municipalities across the country. In the past, these tent cities were forcibly removed by local law enforcement. (For example: the now infamous operation to remove encampments in various Toronto parks.) But this month the City of Hamilton approved a fresh approach—one that acknowledges encampments as an interim reality of the housing crisis and attempts to balance the needs of all community members.

Per new protocols, encampments of five or fewer tents will be permitted in parks and public spaces, provided they are more than 100 metres away from schools, daycares or playgrounds. Outreach workers (not law enforcement) will be the first point of contact in the case of infraction. "We are moving forward with a housing-first, human rights—based approach," says Hamilton mayor, Andrea Horwath. The plan will also include access to washroom and shower facilities and more frequent garbage cleanup."

I have as yet to clarify with St. Patrick's council if they feel it necessary to proceed, or if their resolution purpose and goal has been met. https://macleans.ca/news/why-an-ontario-city-is-now-permitting-homeless-encampments-and-tiny-homes-in-parks/

- In the case of St. Mark's, Kitchener, resolution, well there has been some excitement there too. Thanks to a few members for sending me links/ article clippings on the organization which has been trying to get CRTC & OLG to put an end to sports figures being allowed to promote online gambling.

- Will that be enough for St. Mark's? I don't know. This is pretty new territory so, stay tuned. I am planning Webinars for OCTOBER/ NOVEMBER 2023. I will set the dates once I've spoken to St. Mark's Committee and will keep you informed through your Regional Chair.

McGarry, in 1934, and became the 12th National President in 1942, and on August 15th, Shari Guinta, Hamilton's 43rd President, became the 53rd National President in 2023, making her Hamilton Diocese's 3rd National President. In addition, four women, Isabel Ellinghausen, Jackie Schneider, Patricia Barron, and Shari Guinta, all achieved the role of Provincial President. Many of us have watched over the years as Shari has climbed the ladder and has now reached the bell at the top. Congratulations Shari, from all of the Historians in the diocese.

I am including the 3 lists of names and dates of presidents from three of the four levels of the League for you to view.

I hope you enjoy looking at all these lists as they are a true testimony of our faith, commitment and sisterhood. These were/are women, like you and me, who have dedicated their God-given talents and gifts to help inspire others and to share the good news and deeds for which the League has always stood.

So I ask each of you to PLEASE, think, pray and discern over the next few months to step up and put your name forward for the elections next May.

I look forward to seeing you at the Fall Regional and if you need advice or help, have a question or just want to chat, I am only an email or phone call away.

Sisterhood in the League

At my first provincial convention in Kelowna, the national Spiritual Advisor, Bishop Smith, told the members that the League is a blessing for the church - the church needs the Catholic Women's League. His mother had been a member, and he knew from his mother and his calling to be a priest how important the sisterhood of the League was to the Catholic women of Canada.

In the past month, I have heard of two occasions when the Catholic Women's League has failed as a sisterhood. I just returned from the National Annual Meeting of Members in St. John, NB and heard a story from one of our life members of how she was treated when she moved from one province to another. She was working in one community and decided to join the League there and paid her membership and never heard from the council. She did join another council. Another incident that happened in my own parish occurred when I was at my local library, and I began talking to a woman who was searching for a book in the same place as I was seeking a book. We began talking about books, and the conversation ended up talking about the church. Then I discovered that in 2020, just before the pandemic, she had been awarded her 40-year pin. I was astonished as I had never been aware of her presence in our council. I know the pandemic had affected our membership but, that was not an excuse to not contact her and reach out to her.

The sisterhood of the League is a wonderful gift that we can give to our members. The National Strategic Committee has developed a fantastic program called the Welcome Program. The program was developed to address two critical issues - leave no member behind and validate all members.

The program encourages the involvement of all members. The program also reminds members that everyone is responsible for membership, not just the president. I encourage every member to download the program available on the National website - www.cwl.ca. The program contains great ideas and two questionnaires - one for new members and one for returning members that will help councils to get to know their members so that we can become a fantastic sisterhood of the church in which everyone wants to join.

At our provincial convention in Cornwall, at one of our mini workshops, we were presented with a program called Secret Sisters. This program is very easy and a great way to grow the sisterhood of the League. (A copy of the program follows this article. Thank you Claudette Langdon.)

The mission of the League is to call "its members to grow in faith, to witness to the love of God through ministry and service and its core values- faith, service and social justice". We can fulfill our mission statement through our sisterhood.



Connecting with your CWL sisters through the "SECRET SISTER"

How important is it to connect with our CWL sisters? Let's explore a simple *program* to stay connected with each other to encourage, assist, pray and love each other.

The Secret Sister *Program* was developed by a parish Spiritual Development Chair to stay connected to **all** members.

Not all members attend meetings or can.....

Not all members are engaged in CWL business...

Some members are shy....

Some members do better one on one.....

Who would not like to receive a lovely message or prayer....



The *program* is easy to implement...our goal is to see it in all parishes across the province.

The Parish Faith Chair are the co-ordinations and monitors the 'Secret Sister' *program* in their councils.

At the first/a general meeting have the Faith Chair take note of the members that were present and write the names on pieces of paper with the month and date of their birthday. During the meeting, the names of the members present are placed into a basket and each member picks a name to be their 'Secret Sister'. You can decide if you wish to record the matched Sisters. The members who do not attend that or any meetings are provided a secret sister name by the Faith Chair by putting all council names in a basket and drawing a name for each member who was on the member roster.

A basket is provided for the Secret Sisters' letters at meetings to drop off the letters or cards. The basket is checked before each meeting is over and any letters that have not been picked up by individual members who are in attendance are given to the Faith Chair. The members who are not at the general meeting have their letters mailed to them.

New members throughout the year are always assigned a Secret Sister (usually someone else who is new to the council as well).

Folder file or box can be placed at the church so that members who cannot get to the meetings can drop off their Secret Sister letters when they attend Mass.

Members "send" letters for special events i.e., Mother's Day, Christmas, birthday cards if they know their birthday month, letters of encouragement, and also letters celebrating feast and saint's days.






