Dear League Sisters,

INTRODUCTION: (New Year – New Beginnings)

Happy New Year!

May 2024 bring you peace, prosperity, joy, and love. May God's blessings shower you and bestow upon each of you a vibrant and healthy new year. Let us renew ourselves in the Light and birth of Jesus, and let our focus be outwardly toward Christ and not inwardly toward ourselves. *"Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come: The old has gone, the new is here!"* 2 Corinthians 5:17.

January provides opportunities for fresh starts, to allow for change, new energy, fresh ideas, purification, wellness, and peace in one's life. We can do this in our own lives through commitments of self-care and love. Setting goals for self-improvement each year is a personal process, which grows us as better human beings, and draws us closer to God through goodness and love. The process involves self-reflection, prayer, dedication and discipline to address matters that cause harm to our body, mind, heart, and soul.

Proverbs 16 is an excellent reference in understanding what Scripture and God says about New Year's "resolutions", for through Scripture we find truth. Proverbs 16:9 says, "The heart of a person plans his (her) way, but the Lord establishes his (her) steps." Proverbs tells us that as we grow and discover our gifts and talents, we make plans that we hope would be fulfilling for us in the future, but we must put our trust in God, as it is His plan and, only He knows our future. Proverbs 16:3 says, *"Commit to the Lord whatever you do, and your plans will succeed." One of the most powerful Bible verses about new beginnings is: Jeremiah 29:11 "For I know well the plans I have in mind for you—oracle of the LORD plans for your welfare and not for woe, so as to give you a future of hope."* Here again is my puissant word – **HOPE**.

A servant leader has the ability to let go and let be by submitting to God's higher purposes. In doing so, one can experience a deeper sense of fulfillment, purpose, and alignment with His perfect plan. Embracing God's wisdom and surrendering control will not only calm your body, mind, and soul, it will provide you with peace and confidence. This is especially true for those facing difficult situations in their lives. Praying for patience will give you the perseverance needed to face and see through difficult challenges through. Knowing that God does not promise to immediately rescue us from hardship or suffering but, rather He has a plan for our lives which we must trust. Regardless of our current situation, He can work through it to prosper us, and give us the hope we need for living out our lives with purpose, love and gratitude. May these words provide you and your councils hope, and trust in God.

In this communique, I will continue to share helpful information on leadership development and organization (membership). My focus on leadership development remains through the lens of a Catholic Woman Transformational Servant Leader. We look to Jesus as the perfect model of Servant Leadership, and to Our Blessed Mother Mary as woman Servant Leader, who always put God first.

LEADERSHIP: (Transformational Servant Leadership)

As previously stated, putting God first, followed by putting others before ourselves, are important traits in being a true and good servant leader. Recognizing the human dignity of all people, and making peace when we do wrong and/or cause hurt or harm to others, are critical actions in transforming into a servant leader. St. James said it best when he said, "Faith without deeds is dead." Integrity, transparency, wisdom, and grace are important attributes of a transformational servant leader, but mean nothing without action. Pray for courage and patience to always do what is right no matter how difficult. May Our Lady of Good Counsel guide you in your decisions and actions.

OUR BLESSED MOTHER AS WOMAN SERVANT LEADER MODEL:

Our Blessed Mother Mary is a model servant leader for many reasons but, her most important virtues are: putting God first, humbling herself to do God's will by giving of herself completely, and playing a critical role in the salvation history of humankind.

The new National theme for 2024 & 2025 "Here I am Lord, send me" ties in perfectly with our Blessed Mother's response to God's request of Her through God's messenger, the Angel Gabriel, to be the Mother of God. Mary's response was, "Here I am, the servant of the Lord" (Luke 1:38). Mary's response was a testament in knowing God's pure and gratuitous love for her. Mary accepted not only to carry, birth, and be the mother of the Christ child, she also freely chose to lovingly become a servant and mother to all. Mary gave of herself freely for the sake of the greater good for everyone.

Mary's submission to God's plan knew the sacrifice she would face and, that it would cost her dearly, yet she was willing to be God's servant, and a servant to all. Mary was a woman of great faith, strength and courage. She gave birth to Jesus as her baby, and watched him die as her Savior.

In Luke's Gospel, Mary functions as the first disciple because she [1] receives the grace of God, [2] responds to this grace by confessing her faith in Christ, and [3] proclaims the Gospel of Christ to others. In short, St. Alphonsus states that Mary was truly humble because she gave all the glory to God for everything good in her life: "A soul that is truly humble refuses her own praise, and should praises be bestowed upon her, she refers them all to God." This is a valuable lesson of leadership and humility for those who look to others for praise. We must remember that we are created in God's image, and blessed with gifts and talents to serve and love our Lord and each other. It is a sin to look or need praise from others, as it often serves a darker purpose, such as covetousness, which is an insatiable desire to find fulfillment, meaning and purpose in things, instead of in God, and this can lead one's spirit to other sins.

Mary's top eight qualities were: profound humility, living faith, blind obedience, continual prayer, divine purity, ardent charity, universal mortification, and heroic patience and perseverance. Mary had gusto, strength, and perseverance to always do the right thing, no matter how difficult or what consequences she would endure. Blessed Mary demonstrated model servant leadership through her actions as a disciple in three key areas: 1) invitation (openness and inclusiveness), 2) obedience (following rules and

direction), and 3) perseverance (the courage to press on and always do the right thing no matter how difficult).

There are three important teachings from Our Lady of Good Counsel. These three teachings are:

- 1) To evangelize and teach people to experience the joy of Christ and to spread that joy with others
- 2) To never let adversity beat you down.
- 3) Always help those in need with love and mercy.

Following in our Lady's footsteps, and living our lives through her attributes and virtues, will help us become better women servant leaders. Let us journey towards holiness and to God through the intercession and footsteps of our Blessed Mother. Mary stood by Jesus when haters surrounded him. Mary faced adversity and hatred with grace and great integrity.

The following is a list of essential attributes needed in being a successful servant leader, which I shared in my last newsletter on integrity, which I believe is worth sharing again. Integrity is: Doing what is right, no matter what. Following through with what you say you are going to do, no excuses. The essentials for successful Servant Leader are: Faith – Integrity – Love – Honesty – Loyalty – Humility - Putting others before yourself – Character – Inclusiveness – Transparency – Communication – Courage – Trust – and Hope.

GOVERNANCE

I continue to encourage all members to learn about the League, its governing documents, and the roles, rights, and responsibilities as members and as executives (if serving on an executive). Visit the National website to download and read the League's governing documents, attend League meetings, conventions, League and leadership development opportunities, and ask questions. The League's Constitution & Bylaws (C&B) and National Policy & Procedures (P&P) have been updated and can be found on the National website at <u>www.cwl.ca.</u>

PARISH ELECTIONS

Parish elections are to be held in January or February at the parish council annual meeting of members, in accordance with the League's Constitution and Bylaws. Please remember to forward me your new parish council executive listing at presidentelect@cwlhamilton.ca

TERM LIMITS

The League's Bylaws state that elected terms are held for two years, and elections are to be held every two years to vote in a new slate of executives.

PARISH COUNCIL ANNUAL MEETINGS AND NOMINATIONS & ELECTIONS

It was a pleasure assisting many of our parish councils to prepare for their upcoming annual meeting/elections. For those parish councils reaching their two-year terms this January/February, I will keep your councils in prayer for a successful annual meeting and election outcome.

MEMBERSHIP / RECRUITMENT / MAINTENANCE:

It was a pleasure to work with many parish councils over the past few months. Just a reminder that membership recruitment and maintenance should be an ongoing activity. Promoting the League and encouraging new women to join can be done through regular membership drives, parish bulletin announcements, and social media (including reaching out to our youth, as membership eligibility begins at age 16). Other successful initiatives include sponsoring events such as women retreats, or other events that welcome all women from the parish and outside the parish to attend.

Membership Fees - Due January 1st

According to the League's Constitution & Bylaws, **Membership Fee is due January 1st** annually. The League's Constitution & Bylaws also states that membership is terminated only when the member's term of membership expires through non-payment of membership fees. Memberships terms are from January 1 to December 31st. *"Membership is established and maintained by payment of the annual prescribed membership fee through a local parish council in accordance with Part XVII, Section 4 of the League's Bylaws. Part XVII 4(a) "A membership fee is determined by each individual parish council and shall be due on January 1."*

ANNUAL REPORTS

I asked every council to participate in this process and to complete the reports before or by the assigned deadlines. I also offered my assistance to any councils needing help, and happily assisted several councils who reached out. Thank you to the councils who participated in this important process. Your time, efforts, and hard work is greatly appreciated.

MENTOR SKILLS BANK

Just a reminder that National implemented a Mentor Skills Bank, which is a resource for councils to draw on the expertise of members on an array of topics. The Mentor Skills Bank is to be posted on the National Website.

The winner of the award, along with all nominees, will be recognized and announced at the diocesan convention closing banquet in May 2024.

INCREASE IN MEMBERSHIP CERTIFICATES:

Parish Councils with an increase in memberships will be acknowledged and will receive a certificate at the Spring Regional Meetings 2024.

LEADERSHIP TRAINING AND WORKSHOPS:

I continue to offer training and workshops on leadership development, recruitment of members and membership management, League resource materials, annual reports, governance, and the operations of the League. The work being done by our parish councils is inspiring and greatly appreciated.

As keeper of your council's finances, I encourage you to either download free of charge to a memory stick or print a copy of "*Guidelines for Treasurers*" which can be found on the National website (cwl.ca) under the caption "to organize" under 600 Series "Manuals" scroll down to 609.

Councils have questioned what the .50 cents per member on your annual membership fee remittance covers. Intact Insurance provides insurance for the Catholic Women's League of Canada. *Location and Operations to which this certificate applies is* - Location: Recognized Parish Councils of the Catholic Women's League of Canada; Operations: Catholic Women's Service Groups. This covers all parish members in good standing while performing duties your council provides, such as funeral lunches, coffee socials etc. in your parish. A special certificate is needed if you go outside your parish hall. A special certificate will need to be issued with the outside venue added as "additional insured" which is usual for most malls or any other venue outside your parish hall. I can provide you with Intact contact information if this is needed by your council. INTACT CANNOT PROVIDE a certificate for ANY venue where CWL has ALCOHOL SERVICE. Your parish office may request a copy of this certificate indicating coverage. If you or your President did not receive your 2024 Certificate of Insurance through your Regional Chair, please reach out to me, and I will gladly send it to you.

Dear Sisters in the League,

Wow, we have begun a new year. I would like to wish everyone and their loved ones a very happy 2024.

I would like to highlight a couple of points in this issue of the newsletter. Firstly, I would like to remind everyone of the Bell Let's Talk day. This year it is on Wed. Jan. 24th. This campaign serves to allow conversations about mental health so that the stigma associated with the disease can be lessened and where care is available.

Since January is Alzheimer's Awareness Month in Canada, I would like to give you a little information which I learned at a virtual webinar with Dr. Romi Fung entitled "Dementia Starts in the Body". I attended this webinar last month. It began with a definition of Alzheimer's as being a cognitive mental decline which results from a variety of diseases and injuries which affect the brain cells. There are many possible risk factors such as: smoking, physical inactivity, trauma to the brain, diabetes and blood sugar dysregulation, lack of cognitive stimulus, family history, ApoE gene status, and (something that surprised me) sleep apnea. Apparently, oxygen is extremely important for brain health. The brain needs blood to be able to carry fuel (glucose) and oxygen to the brain. Sleep apnea is dangerous because one stops breathing for a time so, the brain cannot get enough oxygen. Insulin resistance can be a problem because it makes it harder for the cells to receive the glucose they desperately need. To avoid this problem, make sure that protein is part of every meal. Pair carbohydrates with proteins or fibre to prevent blood sugar spikes and insulin resistance. Exercise, both aerobic (eg. 10,000 steps) and anaerobic (eg. resistance bands), can help with the flow of oxygen to the brain. Try to get moving every day and exercise most days of the week.

February is Cancer Month. One of the ways which Canadian Cancer Society is trying to raise awareness of cancer happens to be the challenge of Dry Feb. It is a fundraiser for the society but, it touches on the reasons to avoid drinking. Any alcoholic drink is a downer which affects our mental thinking. Doctors cannot agree on the amount which is safe. Any type or amount of alcohol can increase one's risk for many cancers. Good idea to avoid alcohol.



February 4th, this year, is World Cancer Day.

Please say a prayer for all the persons who are afflicted by this disease.

February 28, in 2024, is Pink Shirt Day. Unfortunately, many students are bullied in schools. This day reminds us to practise kindness and to stop the bullying both online and in person.

Again, wishing you and your families a great start to the new year and many blessings throughout.

This is an exciting year for CWL Hamilton Diocese! I've been following up on two proposed Resolutions from two parishes in our Diocese in 2023 and there is good news to report.

St. Patrick's, Hamilton has been serving the Homeless in Hamilton and President, Evelyn Shoemaker reported that City of Hamilton has provided 24 hour access to washroom facilities in 2 city parks so they consider their resolution "closed". Their parish advocacy and that of other agencies in the city helped to achieve their goal without it officially reaching the Convention floor.

While I have not been able to directly follow up with St. Mark's, Kitchener regarding their resolution re: ending online/ TV Gambling advertising, there has been some activity in the wider community on this. I have received a number of emails with newspaper and social media reports that another group,

https://www.banadsforgambling.ca has had success in effecting change. Notably, the Alcohol and Gaming Commission of Ontario has banned professional athletes from sponsoring or promoting gambling ads as of the end of February 2024. This is a small win for the cause, but a win none the less.

I am Highlighting the Ad Hoc Resolutions Committee from St. Michael's, Kitchener who have worked long hours to get THREE resolutions ready for submission to Mary Capobianco, Provincial Resolutions Chair. No other councils in Ontario are addressing these resolutions. Congratulations to committee champions Denise Dolff, Shani Pregelj and Jakki Jeffs who have been meeting regularly (1-2 times/ week at least) to provide letters, Resolution briefs and references for the January 31/ 2024 deadline. The resolutions will be scrutinized by the Provincial Resolutions Committee and we anticipate a positive response by February/ March 2024. A positive response means a motion from the Hamilton Executive who approve that these can be brought to the floor and presented at the convention.

- 1. **2024: 01-** Enact definition amendments expand elective treatment consent requirements in Ontario's 1996 Health Care Consent Act.
- 2. **2024: 02-** The Canadian Institute for Health Information establish enhanced data collection regulations pertaining to induced abortion.
- 3. **2024: 03-** The Ontario Government create and enact legislation, mandating the collection and annual reporting to the Ministry of Health, of demographic data, from all Ontario out of hospital health facilities providing induced abortion.

I'm very excited to be presenting these 3 resolutions at AMM and as the group has said, if they move forward GREAT. If they don't we will at least have educated over 200 women who will be taking the information back to their parishes. We will at least have INFORMED our members on these issues.

Look out for:

- Updates at the March 2024 Regional Meetings
- Join us at the Resolution Dialogue on Saturday-May 25/ 2024 for a very brief overview.
- Reading of the Resolutions and a successful voting process with passing of the Resolutions by members at the 2024 CWL-AMM

Dear Sisters in the League,



I hope that each of you had a beautiful and heartwarming Advent and Christmas with your loved ones and happy 2024.

I would like to take a moment to apologize to those who may have received an email from me on December 22, asking for a favour from me. It was asking you to purchase gift cards for me as I was unable to get them (for various reasons). <u>That was not I!</u> My email was hacked while I was in the Sault Ste. Marie Cathedral, attending my aunt's funeral. Since then, I have had to not only change my password for protection but, my email address had to be changed as well. So, if you receive anything coming from <u>chocolate3martinis@hotmail.com</u> it is me!

As previously mentioned in earlier newsletters, the role of a Past President and Historian is responsible for the archiving and the history of your council.

I would like to reiterate what items should be preserved for your council in your archives. Items such as minutes, treasurers' ledgers, resolutions, motions, reports, and other items should be placed in the archives.

Remember to ensure that your archives are stored in a fireproof and dry cabinet which has a lock. It is highly recommended that acid free paper be used, and acid free books for your pictures as well. These should be maintained on church property and not in someone's home.

Minutes

The official copies of the minutes signed by both the president and secretary must be placed in your archives. These pages should be numbered as well for the term in the bottom right side of the page and initialed by the secretary. The minutes from the current secretary's term and the two previous secretarial terms are kept. These should be archived after six years. Meaning: Past-past secretary, past secretary and current

secretary is kept by secretary = 6 years. At the end of her two-year term, the past- past minutes are archived and the past and current minutes are given to the new secretary. Then, in two years' time, the past-past minutes are archived, and so forth.

The hard copy of your minutes is permanently retained. If you do have electronic copies, they may be destroyed. Your annual reports, i.e. to diocesan for convention purposes, should also be retained as well, and kept safely archived. Additionally, names mentioned in your minutes, motions, and reports should be first and last names, to ensure the correct person is being accredited with the information provided, etc.

Please, do not permanently store anything on floppy disks, CD's or thumb-drives alone. I say this because technology is continuously changing. Computers were established in 1947, and as you may not know, they started out the size of a room. Now they are quite compact and portable. You may remember the laser and floppy discs; you probably thought that this is a great storage field. Unfortunately, these are no longer used in computers. The disc was replaced by CD's which are now also becoming obsolete for computers. That brings us to the thumb drive which is the current preferred storage utensil. BUT, this too will eventually be replaced. If everything was kept on one of those devices, not only may you not be able to retrieve the information because of the way computer's outside storage has evolved, but at times the outside storage becomes corrupt, and the information irretrievable, resulting in lost information. As much as we would like to achieve a paperless society, somethings do need to be hard copied!

Motion Books

The official copies of the signed and dated motions should remain with the secretary in a 3-ring binder just as the minutes. After six years, the motions then should be put into a file in your storage area and permanently retained, once again using acid free paper or sleeves to preserve them.

Treasurer's Ledgers

The treasurer retains the ledgers for the council for five years, then, they are placed in archives and kept <u>permanently</u>. Any receipts and or cheques should be retained for 7 years, and then destroyed.

Deceased Members Book

The council's Deceased Members Book is very much the history of your members being a part of your council. The book should be retained permanently. The name and year of the deceased member should be placed in this book. If you have a picture of the member and/or her obituary or prayer card with the member's notice, it too, may be kept but is not necessary. This book is wonderful to share at a memorial service celebrating your deceased members. There is a prayer service for this purpose found on the national website or, you can create your own.

There is more information which I will share with you when the next newsletter is published.

May Our Lady of Good Counsel continue to bless you, and guide you in all you do for God, Canada and the Catholic Women's League of Canada.

Dear League sisters,

Welcome to 2024, and Happy New Year. I hope you are all well, and enjoyed the blessings of the Christmas season.

Plans are under way for the Hamilton/Brant Spring Regional Meeting on March 16, 2024, which will be held at Our Lady of the Assumption Parish Hall, in (Elfrida) on the Hamilton East Mountain. Our Lady of the Assumption Council and St. Eugene's Parish Council have collaborated to co-host the meeting. I

encourage all parish councils to collaborate and work together, as many hands make tasks easier to manage. Working together provides opportunities to form stronger connections, and learn and grow together.

Since the last newsletter, I have attended one diocesan executive meeting, assisted councils with various questions, distributed various communications for the diocesan executive, and provided guidance and assistance to some parish councils who reached out when completing their Annual Reports. I was invited and attended a parish council's Christmas Marketplace, which was fabulous!

BEE Informed:

I have been asked why I am so drawn to the honeybee symbol. There are many reasons for this. Firstly, there is a significant spiritual meaning of Bees and honey, as they represent and convey God's blessings, God's love, strength, service, wisdom, community, things of great worth, and even references to Christ. Bees are humble, discreet yet very inspiring and creative. Bees are known servants for the betterment of others, and also known to be messengers of God in some parts of the world. I believe Bees serve as an example for how people should be with one another, for they are reliable, sincere, work in harmony, do every work in proper order to ensure a job well done. I am also drawn to Bees because of their long history and significance to the Catholic faith and Church.

The following may be of interest:

Significance of Bees in the Catholic Church, in particular Honeybees

The Church and the honeybee have a long-entwined history. Early Christians revered the honeybee so much that they have attempted to mimic their fine attributes; they were highly valued. They made certain that bee products which were sacred. They have referenced honeybees in scripture, liturgy and architecture. For example, the Paschal Candle is made from beeswax.

Beyond the candle as a symbol for Christ, it also represented the most holy chastity of Mary the Mo of Christ, "Like Mary, the wax producing bees possessed a mystical combination of fecundity and virginity.

What Saint is associated with bees?

The answer is St. Ambrose, the early Christian philosopher and theologian who encouraged monks to think of the chaste bee as a model for those with qualms about their life burdens. Bees have been associated with St. Ambrose, because of a legend that his father found his infant son's face covered with bees. This was taken as a sign of his future eloquence or speaking with a "honeyed tongue." Sisters, take care of yourselves and each other. "The Art of Kindness is more than behaviour. It involves harbouring a spirit of helpfulness, being generous and considerate and doing so without expecting anything in return." (excerpt from a Mayo Clinic article)

Prov. 16:24 (NAB): "Pleasing words are a honeycomb, sweet to the taste and healthful to the body."

Continue to walk in Kindness, and may Our Lady of Good Counsel guide us.

In Your mercy grant me this special favour... (mention silently your special intentions). The days of the life-giving death and glorious resurrection of Jesus Christ, Your Son, are approaching. This is the hour when He triumphed over Satan's pride, the time when we celebrate the great event of our redemption. The suffering and death of Your Son brought life to the whole world, moving our hearts to praise Your glory.

The power of the Cross reveals Your judgement on this world and the kingship of Christ crucified. Father, through His love for us and through His sufferings, death and resurrection, may I gain eternal life with You in Heaven. Amen.
