For Evangelist John, love marks the core identity of every Christian. John exhorts all Christians to love each other as he describes them as people who love their neighbour (1 Jn 2:10, 3:11).

He also describes God as love – God Is Love. This statement is found only once in the scripture, yet it is the essence of the entire Bible. This revelation about God is an outcome of John's intense meditation about Jesus and His need to come into the world. Jesus' death on the cross is the sign of God's love for humanity. All love, "comes from God," and therefore, everybody who loves is born of God.

In the epistles, John makes three parallel statements about God. They are:

- God is Light (1:5),
- God is Love (4:8), and
- God is Spirit (4:24).

'God is Spirit' explains the metaphysical nature of God. 'God is Light' may give the idea of God's appearance and glory. But the statement, 'God is Love' expresses the character of God which is more appealing to the human heart.

In John's Gospel, the evangelist presents the ultimate expression of God's love not as a model to be imitated, but as a source of Christian life to be lived. Therefore, when the disciples of Christ express their love, it is, in fact, Christ manifesting His own love through them. Through our love for others, Jesus cares for others, He comforts the people, helps the poor, heals the sick and guides them to the Father.

Christian love, therefore, is dynamic. It has the power of God. It creates and recreates. Love carries with it the reward of joy which is the reward of life fully lived in the presence of God who is absolute love.

Dear League Sisters,

Throughout my term as President-Elect and Organization Chair, I have focused on leadership development through the lens of a Catholic Woman Transformational Servant Leader. I will continue this focus during my upcoming tenure as Diocesan President. This being my last submission for the Diocesan Spectrum/Newsletter as your Diocesan President-Elect and Organization Chair, I will maintain consistency in my communique flow and headings, which include: Significance of the month of May; Blessed Mary as our role model leader; Leadership Development; and League and Organization Information.

As such, I will cover: the inner strengths of Mary as servant leader model, leadership self-care, gratitude is the attitude of great leaders, the importance of love and connectedness, the power of hope and prayer, information on the month of May, and important League information.

SIGNIFICANCE OF MAY:

The month of May has a long standing Catholic tradition of holding a special dedication to honouring our Blessed Mother, Mary. The Catholic Church practices

several devotions to Mary during the month of May which include May Crowning, which symbolizes Mary's queenship and her special role in the Catholic Church and in the lives of the faithful. Marian Devotions of the Rosary and other prayers recognize and honour Mary and her significant role in salvation history and seek her intercession and protection. Processions and Pilgrimages provide community gathering opportunities to come together in prayer, reflection, and fellowship, deepening our faith and growing towards holiness. May altars serve as a focal point for prayer and reflection throughout the month of May, fostering a sense of devotion, love and reference for Mary. Special Feast Days are dedicated to Mary, such as the Feast of Our Lady of Fatima on May 13th, and the Feast of the Visitation on May 31st, which provide opportunities for Catholics to celebrate and honour Mary's life, virtues, and the significant role she played in salvation history, by her YES to God's will.

The month of May holds great significance in our Catholic Church as time of dedication to our Blessed Mother Mary, and deepening our devotion to her, seeking her intercession and guidance in our lives as Christians. Let us continue to pray to our League's Patroness Saint, Our Lady of Good Counsel, and dedicate the month of May to Mary through prayer, reflection, and by celebrating her unique and central role in the life of the Catholic Church and in the lives of the faithful.

LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT:

OUR BLESSED MOTHER AS WOMAN SERVANT LEADER MODEL:

Mother Mary serves as a profound role model for us as Catholic women for several reasons, which are deeply ingrained in Catholic tradition and theology. These include:

- Humility and Servanthood: Mary's humility and willingness to serve as the handmaid of the Lord exemplify the meaning of servant leadership. Without hesitation she humbly accepted her role in salvation history, recognizing that her life was not about herself, but it was about serving God and His people according to God's will.
- Devotion and Faithfulness: Mary's steadfast devotion and faithfulness to God's will serves as an example for Catholic women. Mary's unwavering response to the Angel Gabriel, "Behold, I am the handmaid of the Lord; let it be done unto me according to your word", demonstrates her complete trust,

faith, and humble surrender to God's plan, despite her fear of the uncertainness and challenges to come.

- Strength and Resilience: Blessed Mary demonstrated incredible strength. From Jesus' conception to crucifixion, Mary endured pain and sorrow yet, she remained steadfast in her love, faith, and devotion to her son and to God.
- Intercessor and Advocate: As the mother to Jesus, she is closest to our Savior and can intercede our prayers to her son for us. We, as Catholic women, can turn to Mother Mary in times of need to seek her counsel, guidance, protection, and intercession.
- Grace and Virtues: Our Heavenly Mother Mary is the epitome of virtue. She embodies purity, obedience, humility, and great faithfulness and grace. She is our role model as woman, mother, servant, and leader.

Mother Mary's unwavering devotion to God and all of her virtues makes her the perfect role model for every woman, mother, and servant leader.

GOOD LEADERS NEED GOOD SELF-CARE FOR THEMSELVES AND THOSE THEY LEAD:

Good self-care starts with self-respect by demanding respect from others and making time for ourselves. It also starts by recognizing the responsibilities of leadership and the importance of providing a welcoming, inclusive, safe, joyful, and productive environment for those you lead in which to thrive. It is important that we set boundaries for ourselves and use our free will to protect ourselves from the snares of evil, which can attack us in many forms, including in places where we believe to be the safest. Have you ever heard of the phrase "devil in the pews"? It is a metaphorical phrase used to describe people who outwardly appear to be devout/pious yet, their unjust and malicious intentions and actions cause great harm to others. These attacks can come in various forms and, as leaders, it is important to recognize them, shine the light on them, and rid them. Some examples include:

- Gossip, which can cause damage to one's reputation, erosion of trust, and psychological harm.
- Slander, which are false or malicious statements made about someone with the intent to damage their reputation, and could have legal consequences.
- Ostracizing, which involves excluding or shunning someone from something. This is often done as an abuse of power and as a form punishment or retaliation. This attack can cause social isolation, withdrawal, loss of support, and diminishing one's sense of self-worth, belonging, and self-esteem.

 Sabotaging, which involves intentionally undermining or "sabotaging" someone's efforts, goals, or achievements, which can cause the person to fail, destroys relationships, trust, violates integrity, and opportunities.

Gossip, slander, ostracizing, and sabotaging are destructive behaviours that have far-reaching consequences for individuals, teams, and organizations. Good leaders need to raise awareness of the dangers of these behaviours. By promoting empathy and compassion, and fostering a culture of respect and inclusivity, we can create safer, more supportive environments where everyone can thrive and contribute positively and respectfully. Nobody likes to deal with controversy or issues, but good leaders recognize that it comes with the territory and have the courage to address it and not condone or ignore it.

GRATITUDE is the ATTITUDE of EVERY GOOD LEADER:

"Gratitude is the Attitude" is a powerful mindset and philosophy for every leader, as it emphasizes the importance of cultivating gratitude as a fundamental aspect of well-being and personal development, which is also a component of self-care. The daily practice of having an attitude of gratitude enables us to acknowledge and appreciate the positive aspects in life, even the ones we take for granted, like waking up each morning, breathing, having food and a roof over our heads. We begin to see through the weeds that clutter the beauty in our lives, the people, experiences, and the blessings that bring joy, fulfillment and true meaning to our existence. The ability to develop an attitude of gratitude will improve your mental and physical health, enhance relationships, and enhance your resilience and coping skills so as to resolve issues with logic and peace.



LEADERSHIP TRAINING AND WORKSHOPS:

I am a strong believer that knowledge is power and that, in order to do any job well, people must be equipped with all the information and tools they need to fulfil their responsibilities and succeed. My father taught me that people must be equipped with the right tools in order to do a job well. My mother taught me, when working with others, there needs to be clear and understood vision and expectations that is supported and respected by all. The message here ladies is that good leaders are transparent, share what they know and share new information in a timely manner. They are mentors and champions for those they lead. Good leaders communicate a clear vision, instructions and allow for growth of those they lead. Our Hamilton/Brant Regional Chair, Colleen Ionson, often uses a famous quote "The secrecy of my job prevents me from knowing what I'm doing ".

Since joining the diocesan executive council, I have made it a personal mission to develop and deliver training tools and workshops on: leadership development, Catholic women leadership, recruitment of members, membership management, League resource materials, annual reports, governance, parliamentary procedure, best business practices, parish council nominations & elections process, and operations of the League. I also customize specific presentations upon request.

I also remind you of Nationals Mentor Skills Bank, which is an excellent resource for councils looking to draw on the expertise of members on an array of topics.

As the soon to be Diocesan President, I look forward to continue helping our members grow in the League and as Women Transformation Servant Leaders.

Fair nominations and elections are essential for upholding democratic principles, promoting members' rights, inclusivity, and fostering trust. Those entrusted with the responsibility must invest time into learning the process and do whatever is possible to ensure that member's rights and the integrity of the process are given priority.

DON'T FORGET TO SEND ME PARISH COUNCIL EXECUTIVE CHANGE INFORMATION:

As this term of the diocesan council winds down and a new council is elected to commence its term on May 26, 2024, it is important that I have your updated executive listings for your council as the soon to be Diocesan President. This information can be sent to me by email at <u>presidentelect@cwlhamilton.ca</u>

MEMBERSHIP / RECRUITMENT / MAINTENANCE / PROTECTION OF INFORMATION:

Please continue to promote the League and do your best to recruit new members and maintain existing members. You can do this through regular membership drives, pulpit presentations, parish bulletin announcements, and social media including reaching out to our youth 16 and older. Hold events and invite women from within and outside of the parish to attend.

The collection and retention of a member's information is to be protected and safeguarded by the Vice-President/Organization Chair (formally known as the President-Elect/Organization Chair). It is important to be familiar with the *Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act*, also known as FIPPA. The *Act* protects the privacy of personal information while providing individuals with a right of access

to their own information. It is thus critical that member's information is kept safe and secure.

LEAGUE MEETINGS AND ANNUAL MEETINGS OF MEMBERS (CONVENTIONS):

I am often asked if any member can attend a League meeting or an Annual Meeting of Members. The answer is, YES! I refer you to Part XV Section 4: of the League's Constitution and Bylaws. It states: "Any member may attend annual meetings or conventions at any level and may speak at business sessions at the discretion of the chairperson."

CWL INSURANCE COVERAGE:

I decided to keep this in for this edition as I continue to receive inquiries about our CWL insurance and our coverage. Members should know that they are covered under the CWL Insurance policy when attending CWL meetings, no matter where the meetings are held.

*NOTE: CWL events that councils hold that include liquor is <u>not</u> covered under this policy. Councils will need to purchase Special Event Insurance at their own expense.

Councils may apply for special "top up" insurance. For example, if a council wanted to sell tickets in a mall and the mall required more insurance than the maximum insurance coverage in our policy. A council can request a one-time topup and pay for additional insurance coverage for a specific activity. This is done directly between the council and the Insurance Broker.

Please ensure that your council has a copy of the 2024 Insurance Certificate. If you do not have a copy of the 2024 Certificate of Insurance, or if you have any questions, please contact me at presidentelect@cwlhamilton.ca

Welcome to the month of May!

My final newsletter! What am I going to share with you and not sound like a broken record?

It came to me when several councils asked, "What do I need to save?" Archiving is an important part of keeping your council's history for current and future members to look back on, to see how and what their parish Catholic Women's League has accomplished in serving God and Canada over the years. You may ask "What as Treasurer do I need to save?" Interesting enough as I was looking into this to answer the council's question, I learnt a few things. The first place I went to look was the National website. I found under "RESOURCES" "MANUALS" 601 Archive Guidelines for League History and 601B Archives Brochure. The following is taken from the archive guidelines ----"Treasurers' books (ledgers only) are retained and may be placed in archives after five years. Cheques and receipts are kept for five years and then destroyed.

The second place I went to was the Policy and Procedure Manual. The National manual states what they have listed in the Archive Guidelines and Brochure. The following is taken from the Hamilton Diocesan Policy and Procedure Manual - Section 4 xxiv keep the following in storage for 7 years in a safe place: a) cancelled cheques; b) receipts; c) expense statements and bills; d) general ledgers; e) per capita journal; f) bank statements; g) deposit books.

Your own council's Policy and Procedure Manual would be your go to place. If there is nothing on archiving in your manual then I encourage you to do so by following the National Guideline and Brochure.

There are many resources and manuals available to help you in your position as Treasurer. Most of them can be downloaded, printed or saved on a USB from the National website. I recommend you print of a copy of Guidelines for Treasurers to reference. Your President receives communiques from the National office so ask that she pass onto you any from the National Secretary-Treasurer. These communiques are also found on the website. I encourage you to go to the Diocesan website cwlhamilton.ca and check out the Spectrum newsletters posted over the past two years, containing many helpful items from your diocesan executive.

In closing I wish to thank you for your support and sisterhood over the past two years as your Hamilton Diocesan Treasurer. It has been a joy to serve and share with you.

Dear Sisters in the League,

I love to watch a good TV show or movie, although I can attest to you that I do not do much of either since COVID-19 entered our lives. Instead, I actually find myself reading much, much more.

However, there were a few shows that I did like some years back. Everyone's taste is different so, I judge no one as to their taste of music, books, movies, etc.; as "they say to each their own".

From 1994 – 2003 a show called **"Touched by an Angel" starring Roma Downey, Della Reese, and John Dye** were angels who came back to teach people that there is much good in the world, you just needed to open your eyes to see it. It was fiction but heartwarming at times. I did enjoy it when I watched it.

Back in the early 2000's, on a snowy Sunday morning, I drove to Oakville to be present at a parish who had asked for the diocesan council to come in and help their council. What I didn't know, when I left the house, was how bad Highway 403 was. The cars were spaced well apart and not going more than 50 Kph. All of the cars were in the inside lane, in 5 – 6 inch ruts of snow. I knew I needed to get off at Trafalgar Road. I started to make a lane change. I could feel the back end of the car fishtail a bit but, I was able to correct it with no problem.

My mind was contemplating how I was going to make this lane change safely when I suddenly went into a spin. I made 1 ³⁄₄ rotations not hitting another car, the guard rail, or cement abutment, and stopped perfectly sideways underneath the overpass.

Then, a most glorious thing that happened: I was **touched by 3 angels!** A set of hands held my head firmly back against the head rest, while 2 other sets of hands held my shoulders and just below my clavicles. I could feel every finger pressing on me. And while this was taking place, a voice called out:

"Bruce (that is my husband) said, 'Take your hands off the wheel.""

I thank these angels for saving my life that snowy morning, and think of them often wondering who they were! Were they my parents, my grandparents, other family members or friends, or were they my own special guardian angels sent down from heaven and from God to protect me that snowy Sunday morning?

I finally did make it off the highway and stopped to thank God, and to compose myself. I made it to the church where I met the others: Mary Carlin, Georgina Bourke, and Pat Crawford. They all said I looked like I had seen a ghost! And, then I told them my story. My efforts going there that morning did pay off as the council continued to survive and stay alive.

Later that day, I went home via Lake Shore with the sun shining brightly and those angels smiling upon me, on cleared roads.

Another show which ran from 2005 – 2011 was *"Medium"* staring Patricia Arquette, Miguel Sandoval and Jake Weber. In this show Patricia Arquette could see the dead; she could see things that happened or were to happen, and solved mysteries and homicides.

Being the Historian over the past year, and going through all of the names of past presidents in parish councils and elected officers, I too, can see the deceased in my mind's eye!

While updating a binder filled with hundreds of names of women throughout the diocese from between 1993 until the present day, I would read a name, stop and reminisce on her, and sometimes even a tear and a smile would appear. There were diocesan presidents such as: Evelyn Sorbora 1993-1995, Jerri Hasey 1999-2001, Mary Carlin 2005-2007, and Georgina Bourke 2007-2009, all who have returned to the Lord. And of course, there are other dear friends/officers: Moira McPherson, Carol Gorgi, Beth Anne Elliott, and Shirley Sullivan. How I miss them.

When I went through the parish listings, oh, how my heart ached when I read, and remembered these women's faces, and recalled their passion and love of the League. There were wonderful women like: Sue McDonald (we worked many hours on resolutions), Annie Settimi, Julia Henry, Gemma Wells, Paula Pelcar, Doreen Redmond, Lilian Orzel (my very special friend), Audrey Horvath, Rosanna Carrozzella, Patricia Collins, Mary Glaab, Barb Ashby (we were Regional Secretaries together), and all missed by their League Sisters and family. So, as you see, I do see angels and I do see the dead (in my mind only). I pray for them, and ask them to watch over me, and my Sisters in the League.

May Our Lady of Good Council be our eternal angel.

Spectrum Report – May, 2024 Go Make a Difference! Sharing His Promise, Love and Hope!



Dear Sisters in the League,

As I compose my last Spectrum Report as the last Hamilton Diocesan CWL Education and Health Chair, I think back to the last two years. While I have tried to educate myself in the various aspects of my convenorship, I hope to also have imparted the information to you, the readers.

Last month, I attended a webinar on climate change with Nikki Sanchez who has worked with David Suzuki. The webinar "Everyday Climate Solutions" gave many ideas of how to protect our environment. Did you know that only 9% of our recyclables actually get recycled? Most of them end up in the landfills or oceans. We need to think before we purchase anything. Don't consume unnecessary products (reusing is very important). We should eat locally sourced foods so as not to have them travel such a great distance. Try not to waste paper since it takes 6 lbs. of water to make only a few sheets of paper. Did you know that Canada has become the #1 deforestation country in the world? Unbelievable! We require the trees to take in the carbon dioxide and give us oxygen in order to live. A suggestion to fight this atrocious behaviour would be to get in touch with our MP's and MPP's and tell them that this is not right.

May 6 – 10 is Mental Health Week. Mental illness may affect anyone. Approximately 1% of Canadians suffer from bipolar disorder while another 1% suffer from schizophrenia. Other mental illnesses include major depression (about 5.4% of Canadians) and anxiety and eating disorders (4.6% or more of Canadians). The youth in this country may start to experience some sort of mental illness before their 20's leading many to take their own lives. Unfortunately, Canada does not contribute enough funds for the population to receive sufficient mental health services. Something needs to change in order for the persons who are afflicted with mental illness to get better.

May 5 – 11 is National Hospice Palliative Care Week. Palliative care seeks to relieve the suffering in terminally ill patients till the end of their natural life. Life is a gift from God. MAID (medical assistance in dying) strives to end their life before the natural conclusion. A kit ("12 Hours of Prayer for Palliative Care") full of prayers and other resources can be downloaded from the National website (cwl.ca). Hopefully, many councils may encourage their members to pray for palliative care.

During the month of May, school boards celebrate Education Week with many activities which complement the work of students. Hopefully, many of our members will be able to attend the happenings, and see what the schools have to offer. I would like to thank the teachers, principals, school employees, students, and their parents for all the work that they perform for education.

June 4th is National Health and Fitness Day. I have written quite a few times about the importance of good nutrition (the plate solution). This time, I would like to speak about exercise. Everyone should be following a moderate endurance activity most days in order to feel better. Moderate exercise, such as brisk walking, swimming, and dancing, will make your heart rate go faster, your breathing quicker, and your body temperature slightly warmer. You should feel completely recovered after 30 minutes of rest. Remember, for the most benefit with each day of exercise, use the Be FIT acronym: Frequency (most days of the week), Intensity (how hard), Time (length of time you exercise each day).

Hope to see many of you at the CWL Convention in Kitchener on May 25 – 26. It will be remarkable!

Also I grew in confidence as a woman, and the great value we should place on the league and its greatness in Canada as a whole. Never underestimate the Catholic voice we have in Canada. And oh how our country needs us right now.
